	Actions Lincolnshire LA has worked hard on reducing the gap and continues to do so despite some of the contextual difficulties, reduced budgets and increasing autonomy of schools which is leading to less influence of the LA. Specific projects include:			
We want to close the gap so children eligible for free school meals achieve as well as their peers	Leading a programme of 1 to 1 tuition The single most effective intervention has been through the implementation of the 1:1 tuition programme. This was targeted at Year 6 pupils specifically those who were in receipt of FSM or LAC. The local authority ensured all schools received tuition place regardless of their size. This was therefore a very effective mechanism for meeting the needs of the FSM pupils in small schools.			
	Leading a programme of Summer and Easter schools The summer school and Easter school provision continues to be funded by the local authority and has impacted considerably in specific schools with larger cohorts.			
	Maintaining the role of advisers and focussing their work stream on vulnerable groups The adviser role has changed markedly over the last 18 months and now reflects a much increased focussed on measuring the impact of provision on vulnerable groups of pupils including those with free school meals. Whilst we are still working on increasing schools focus on his group (particularly where the numbers of FSM are very small) there has already been a marked impact in the performance within EYFS and KS1.			
	'Developing the Lincolnshire Tracker and supporting schools in its use The Lincolnshire Tracker is a data tracking spreadsheet produced by the LA for all year groups which is used by many schools to track FSM pupils and other vulnerable groups. Although it is			

difficult to measure impact, many head teachers report that it has been instrumental in their ability to track vulnerable groups and hold teachers to account.

Next steps

Several projects have recently been introduced but it is too early to measure the impact through SAT results. Projects include:

Collaborative partnerships

Funding small and medium size schools to work in partnership to support and challenge each other with a focus on vulnerable groups including FSM pupils.

Strengthening leadership programme

Using head teachers from good schools to support head teachers in satisfactory schools with a focus on vulnerable groups.

Education adviser work stream focussed on SEND pupils

All education advisers have lead monitoring focussed on vulnerable groups with head teachers, SENDCOs and governors with responsibility for SEND.

Improved data tracking

Greater data analysis of FSM pupils in all year groups through governor training, challenge by advisers and provision of more data.

Every Day Counts

The LA is supporting schools with an authority wide project that sets out clear guidance for schools and parents for authorising absence particularly around term time holidays. This is expected to have a significant impact on attendance especially or those pupils who claim FSM.

Activity update At the end of July NEET figures for 16 – 18 year olds were 4.9% which is below the East Midlands (5.8%) and our statistical neighbours except Shropshire. However, the number of young people whose status is unknown continues to be significantly higher than the East Midlands and may mean this (NEET) figure is not accurate. The statutory duty to provide careers guidance to young people in key stage 4 transferred to schools from September 2012. This has enabled us to switch the focus of the local authority Careers Service to supporting NEET aged 16 – 18 and to tracking young people's status. This has already resulted in a reduction in the unknowns in the key target groups from 6.2% to 4.8% for 16 year olds and from 13.9% to 13.6% for 17 year olds. Whilst resources have been allocated to tracking these learners, there are a range of issues in terms of accurate contact details particularly for 17 year olds with whom no-one has been working for the last year. The refocusing of the Careers Service activities will mean they are able to maintain contact and track young people from when they leave school. Information is already being gathered from school sixth forms, FE colleges and other providers in relation to enrolments in order to identify progress in meeting the September Guarantee. This will enable the service to focus on those young people who have not secured an education or training place. There has also been a significant drop in the number of young people in jobs without training from June 2011 to July 2012 from 8% to 2.6%.
