1 <u>APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE/REPLACEMENT MEMBERS</u>

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors M A Griggs, R P H Reid and Executive Support Councillor B M Dobson.

2 DECLARATIONS OF MEMBERS' INTERESTS

No declarations were made at this stage of the meeting.

3 <u>MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING OF THE ENVIRONMENT AND</u> <u>ECONOMY SCRUTINY COMMITTEE HELD ON 9 APRIL 2019</u>

RESOLVED

That the minutes of the previous meeting held on 9 April 2019, be agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

4 <u>ANNOUNCEMENTS BY THE CHAIRMAN, EXECUTIVE COUNCILLORS</u> <u>AND LEAD OFFICERS</u>

The Chairman paid tribute to Councillor Barry Dobson's chairmanship of the Committee adding that it had been a pleasure to work with him.

Executive Councillor C J Davie made the following announcements:-

- The lovely weather over Easter had attracted numerous tourists to the county and hoped that it was the start of successful season for the tourism sector.
- The "Made in Lincolnshire Awards" had been recently launched and gave businesses the chance to win a prestigious prize. One business had used the award in their publicity. Members were asked to encourage businesses in their Division to apply for the awards.
- The Midlands Engine was now starting to describe the importance of investment along the whole of the A46 corridor and officials had visited the Port of Immingham. He had told Midlands Engine to keep on promoting Lincolnshire and had also taken the opportunity to do the same at the Local Government Association's Economy Board.
- The District Council Elections had taken place and he looked forward to working with the District Councils to promote growth in the county.
- Members from Hunan's main governing body would be coming to the county this week to assess potential investments in the county.
- He was pleased to welcome Councillor Barry Dobson as his Support Councillor. He stated that Barry had knowledge of the food business and previous chairmanship of this Committee he looked forward to working with him.
- He was aware of the on-going discussions taking place between the Government and British Steel on the future of the company. The effects of any closure on Scunthorpe and the surrounding area were discussed.
- He stated that Brexit needed to be resolved as soon as possible to give businesses clarity.

5 COMMISSIONING OF ADULT SKILLS AND FAMILY LEARNING

The Committee considered a pre-decision scrutiny report in connection with the Adult Skills and Family Learning programme commissioning and contract management arrangements from 2019/20.

In response to comments made by members officers stated that the duration of the courses were 45 hours maximum; the "Guided Learning Hours" were detailed in Appendix A, with 42% of courses 6-9 hours in duration; all of the courses had been completed by the learners (6,000 in total); additional courses could be provided for those learners that had completed 3 in an academic year but an assessment was required and many courses ran already in Lincoln with no wish from the Council to duplicate them.

RESOLVED

- (a) That the members' comments be noted.
- (b) That the recommendations in respect to the commissioning of an Adults Skills and Family Learning Programme be supported.
- (c) That the Committee receive a progress report in twelve months.

6 DIGBY FLOOD ALLEVIATION SCHEME

(Note: Councillor C R Oxby requested that a note should be made in the minutes that he was a member of the Witham 1st Internal Drainage Board).

The Committee considered a pre-decision scrutiny report in connection with the Digby Flood Alleviation Scheme.

Members stressed the importance of traffic management in the scheme. Officers agreed and explained the traffic management being put in place.

Members welcomed the scheme as flooding in Digby had been a problem for many years and agreed that similar arrangements to those used to manage the Middle Rasen Surface Water Flood Alleviation Scheme should be used for this scheme.

RESOLVED

- (a) That the members' comments be noted.
- (b) That the recommendations in respect to the Digby Flood Alleviation Scheme be supported and requested that similar arrangements to those used to manage the Middle Rasen Surface Water Flood Alleviation Scheme should be used for this scheme.

7 WATER RESOURCES EAST

The Committee considered a pre-decision scrutiny report in connection with the Council's membership of Water Resources East, an independent not for profit company which provided an opportunity for the Council to influence outcomes, including decisions on Nationally Significant Water Infrastructure.

Officers stated that the Internal Drainage Boards were members of a large advisory group to Water Resources East.

RESOLVED

- (a) That the members' comments be noted.
- (b) That the recommendations in respect to the Council's membership of Water Resources East, be supported.

8 TEAM LINCOLNSHIRE AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME 2019/2020

The Committee considered an update report on the Team Lincolnshire programme.

Dale Lui, who ran an architectural/ developer business, based in Nettleham, attended the meeting and outlined the purpose of his and his role in Team Lincolnshire. He supported the Team's importance to encourage economic growth and investment in Lincolnshire.

Members supported and welcomed public and private involvement in Team Lincolnshire. Their comments included:-

- The positive effects of Team Lincolnshire on business development. The development of small engineering firms in Gainsborough and the increase in academic courses attended increasingly by students from the Far East at the University of Lincoln were given as examples.
- Members had a role to play in disseminating and sharing information with their local communities about the Ambassador Programme.

Officers agreed to put members on the mailing list to receive communications in connection with the Ambassador Programme. Officers stated that consideration would be given to Team Lincolnshire having a presence at the Lincolnshire Show next year.

Dale Lui agreed to speak to those members about sports provision in their communities outside of the meeting.

RESOLVED

- (a) That members' comments be noted.
- (b) That the roll out of the Team Lincolnshire Ambassador Programme 2019/20, as detailed in the report, be agreed and that the Committee receive a further update in six months.
- (c) That members be invited to local events organised in the Programme.

9 <u>PROJECT OUTLINE FOR MARKET DEEPING GROW-ON BUSINESS</u> <u>SPACE</u>

(Note: Councillor B Adams requested that a note should be made in the minutes that he was a member of South Kesteven District Council).

The Committee received a report in connection with the potential need for a grow-on facility to complement the Eventus Centre for Business and Innovation, Market Deeping. Officers stated that the recent findings of a place-specific feasibility study indicated a market need in the catchment area and provided an initial development appraisal as a basis to inform the project.

Members' views were sought on the Options detailed in the report.

Comments by members included:-

- An enquiry about the size of the Eventus Centre and whether there were any similar facilities in the vicinity which could meet demand. Officers outlined the other facilities in the area but there was only one of which was within the grow-on space range.
- Owing to the success of the Eventus Centre businesses were reluctant to move from the Centre until they could find more suitable premises.

- A twin approach should be pursued this meant, firstly, making use of the current budget allocation and potential funding from the Greater Lincolnshire Local Enterprise Partnership GL LEP) and then, secondly, examining a long term business strategy for this area.
- Obtaining land for commercial/industrial development in South Kesteven was an issue due to a shortage of such land.
- The compulsory purchase of land should be considered by the Council.

RESOLVED

- (a) That members' comments be noted.
- (b) That officers examine working up a design for a grow-on facility to complement the Eventus Centre with the cost being met from the current budget allocation and potential funding from the GL LEP and, secondly, examine a longer term business strategy to meet the commercial/industrial demand for grow-on facilities in the area.

10 <u>LINCOLNSHIRE'S RELATIONSHIP WITH HUNAN, CHINA - EMERGING</u> <u>PRIORITIES</u>

The Committee considered an update report in connection with the developing civic and strategic relationship with Hunan Province, China.

Officers explained the geography of Hunan, Chinese culture and how Hunan was similar to Lincolnshire in supporting agriculture and advanced manufacturing production.

Officers stated that China was prepared to invest in companies in Lincolnshire in return for increased technical and operational knowledge with Chinese investment in Dynex, Lincoln given as an example.

Officers agreed to submit a regular report to the Committee on the Council's relationship with Hunan.

RESOLVED

That the report be noted and that the Committee receive regular reports on the relationship between the Council and Hunan.

11 ENERGY PROCUREMENT

(Note: Councillor C L Strange requested that a note should be made in the minutes that he was related to the person identified in paragraph 18 of the report).

The Committee considered a report which sought the views of members in connection to the Council's procurement of green or brown electricity to power its corporate portfolio. The views of the Overview and Scrutiny Management Board and this Committee would be reported to the Leader of the Council. The former Committee had already recommended to the Leader that the ESPO (a public sector

body representing local authorities for procurement purposes) agreement should be continued for a further four years from October 2020.

Officers stated that the ESPO framework had the flexibility to buy green or brown energy for individual large customers like the County Council.

Members were informed that the additional cost of buying green energy was relatively cheap compared to buying brown energy and the extra cost would be recovered by the rebated received from ESPO.

RESOLVED

That the comments made by members be noted and that the Leader of the Council be informed that this Committee supports the purchase of green electricity to power its portfolio.

Summary:

The County Council is currently undertaking a statutory review of its existing Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) that was published in 2014 and sets out how the County Council will engage and consult the public and stakeholders with respect to the preparation of minerals and waste planning policy documents, and when determining planning and related applications.

On 18 December 2018 the Executive approved a Draft SCI for public consultation which took place from 21 January 2019 to 4 March 2019. The comments from that consultation exercise have been considered (Appendix A) and, where appropriate, modifications have been put forward (Appendix B) and incorporated into a Proposed SCI (Appendix C).

Subject to the endorsement of the Executive, the full County Council will be recommended to adopt the Proposed SCI. If this recommendation is accepted, the document would then be published on the County Council's website with the supporting documents.

Recommendation:

That the Executive endorse the Proposed Statement of Community Involvement attached to this report as Appendix C and recommend to the full County Council that it is adopted as the final Statement of Community Involvement.

Alternatives Considered:

1. Not to proceed with a recommendation to the full County Council to adopt the Proposed Statement of Community Involvement.

Reasons for Recommendation:

The Council is required to review the current SCI by October 2019 and then, if necessary, to update it. It is, however, already considered that the SCI needs to

be updated with respect to changes in legislation, to make it more user friendly and to give greater emphasis to the role of social media in publicising planning matters.

Progressing the proposed SCI to adoption will therefore ensure that the County Council is complying with the statutory requirements by having an up to date SCI.

Background

- 1. The County Council is required by the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 to have a Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) setting out how it will engage and consult the public and stakeholders with respect to:
 - the preparation of minerals and waste policy documents; and
 - the determination of planning applications, including related applications such as applications for listed building consent.
- 2. The current SCI was last updated in 2014 and, under the provisions of the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) ("the 2012 Regulations"), the County Council is required to review the document by October 2019 (five years from the last update).
- 3. On 18 December 2018, the Executive considered a report by the Chief Executive recommending that the SCI be reviewed and updated slightly early to:
 - take account of changes to legislation;
 - increase the use of social media; and
 - make the document clearer and more "user friendly".
- 4. The report put forward a Draft Consultation SCI which had been subject to the prior consideration of the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee. That Committee had supported the recommendation in the report to proceed with public consultation for a period of six weeks, but passed on the following comments as part of the consideration of the item:
 - The Committee stressed the need to set the correct level of expectation when publicising and notifying the public on planning applications.
 - The Committee supported greater use of both the County Council's social media channels and targeted social media such as Facebook.
 - The Committee highlighted the need to be clear and stressed the need to ensure that social media engagement included clear guidance on where and how to submit comments to the County Council.
 - A member of the Committee queried whether the proposal to issue press notices solely in the Lincolnshire Echo for certain types of application was a token gesture, due to its limited coverage across the County.

Having carefully considered the comments of the E&E Scrutiny Committee, the Executive approved the Draft SCI for public consultation.

Bodies Consulted on the Draft Statement of Community Involvement (January 2019)

- 5. Whilst there is no statutory requirement for the County Council to consult when reviewing and updating its SCI, it is considered to be good practice to do so in order to enable communities and other stakeholders to have their say on the content of the new SCI. Regard was therefore had to the consultation requirements for Local Plans (as set out in the 2012 Regulations) as a basis for identifying relevant consultees for the Draft SCI. In particular, involvement was sought from all relevant 'specific' and 'general' consultation bodies specified in the regulations.
- 6. The **Specific Consultation Bodies** consulted on the Draft SCI included (but were not limited to) statutory organisations such as:
 - The Environment Agency
 - Historic England
 - Natural England
 - Highways England
 - Statutory Undertakers and Infrastructure Providers (e.g. National Grid, Anglian Water, Western Power, BT)
 - Clinical Commissioning Groups
 - Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership
 - Greater Lincolnshire Local Enterprise Partnership
 - All Parish and District Councils within Lincolnshire [including the Lincolnshire Association of Local Councils], along with all neighbouring County, District and Parish Councils that share a border with Lincolnshire.

The **General Consultation Bodies** that were consulted on the Draft SCI included (but were not limited to):

- Voluntary bodies whose activities benefit Lincolnshire
- Bodies representing the interests of different racial, ethnic or national groups in Lincolnshire
- Bodies representing the interests of different religious groups in Lincolnshire
- Bodies representing the interests of disabled persons in Lincolnshire
- Bodies representing the interests of persons carrying on business in Lincolnshire.

In addition, all Members of the County Council were notified of the consultation. The Draft SCI was published for consultation on 21 January 2019 for a period of six weeks ending on 4 March 2019.

Results of the Consultation Exercise

- 7. Details of the responses received during the consultation exercise are detailed in the Consultations Outcome Statement attached as Appendix A, which also includes the officer response to each comment received. A total of 26 respondents made 34 individual comments on the Draft SCI. The respondents included statutory and voluntary bodies, local authorities, parish councils and planning consultants. Of the 26 respondents, 15 were local authorities or parish councils, with two thirds of these organisations located outside of, but adjacent to, the County.
- 8. About half of all comments received either expressed support or had no specific comments or objection in relation to the Draft SCI. In terms of specific comments it is considered that the main issues raised are:
 - Gainsborough Town Council would like to see wider use of press notices and social media beyond those specified in the Draft SCI;
 - South Lincolnshire Blind Society state that the Draft SCI gives little consideration to how the County Council will engage and consult the blind population within the County, but has not made any specific recommendations for its improvement other than incorrectly stating that it contains no statement to say what alternative formats will be available.
 - Leicestershire County Council recommend the removal of links to web pages because these frequently change thereby removing their usefulness
 - Heighington Parish Council state that the amount of abbreviations used makes the document difficult to read and request that a glossary is included.
 - Hughes Craven Ltd (a consultancy specialising in minerals) has raised a number of points on how the County Council will engage with mineral operators and their agents. In particular, concerns are raised over the use of the County Council's website as the preferred method for sharing information and receiving responses because, it is claimed, few mineral operators within the County actively check or are even aware of the website. They do, however, welcome the proposal to circulate letters to relevant parties, suggesting that this should include mineral operators and their agents. To enable this, they suggest that the County Council should establish a contact list of both operators and agents which should be updated on a regular basis.
 - Robert Doughty Consultancy Ltd has also asked the Council to give a commitment to create and maintain a consultation database of mineral/waste operators and their agents.

Comments of the Planning and Regulation Committee

- 9. In addition to the general consultation carried out on the Draft SCI, the Planning and Regulation Committee were asked for their informal comments at their meeting on 4 March 2019. The Committee welcomed progress on the review of the Statement of Community Involvement and was particularly supportive of the proposed use of social media to publicise some applications. They recommended, however, that this should be extended to cover minor applications that affect the setting of a listed building or the character and appearance of a conservation area.
- 10. The Committee also questioned the proposal to limit press notices to the Lincolnshire Echo, which they advised is not widely available in all parts of the County particularly in the south. Whilst they acknowledged the limited benefit and high cost of press notices, they considered that limiting notices to one newspaper was a minimal "tick box" approach. They therefore recommended that in those parts of the County where the Lincolnshire Echo is not widely available, other local papers should be used. In this respect the point was made that some people, particularly the elderly, were not on the internet and relied on local papers. In addition, they considered that opportunities should be sought to publicise applications in local free papers.
- 11. Finally, the view was expressed that neighbour notifications should not be restricted to adjoining properties, but should be distributed more widely.

Modifications to the Draft Statement of Community Involvement

- 12. In response to the comments made on the Draft SCI, a number of modifications have been proposed as set out in the Proposed Schedule of Modifications to the Draft Statement of Community Involvement (January 2019) attached as Appendix B. These include the following:
 - Extended use of Social Media it is proposed to extend the use of social media to publicise planning applications for minor development which affect the setting of a listed building or character and appearance of a Conservation Area (excluding works that only affect the interior of Grade II Listed Buildings) recognising the particular sensitivity of these designations. This should address one of the concerns of the Planning and Regulation Committee and will go some way to addressing the concerns of Gainsborough Town Council.
 - Alternative Languages and Formats the draft SCI already includes contact details for obtaining the document in alternative languages and formats, but this is located at the back of the document. To make it more prominent, it is proposed to emphasise this information on the contents page of the document in response to the concerns of the South Lincolnshire Blind Society.
 - Removal of links to individual web pages where reference is made to County Council documents, the link will be replaced by reference to the

County Council's web site where the document can be accessed. In other cases, it should be straight forward to locate the documents through a search engine such as Google. This should overcome the potential problem of links being changed identified by Leicestershire County Council.

- Inclusion of a List of Abbreviations to address the concerns of Heighington Parish Council.
- Increased Press Notice coverage the concerns raised over use of the Lincolnshire Echo is that this paper is not widely available in certain parts of the County. The proposed SCI therefore removes the reference to the Lincolnshire Echo and simply states that for certain types of application a press notice will be placed in a local newspaper. The choice of newspapers will be regularly reviewed, but initially it is proposed to use the Lincolnshire Echo for most of the County where it is readily available, the Skegness Standard in the east, and the Lincolnshire Free Press in the south. This should help to address concerns originally raised by the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee and subsequently echoed by the Planning and Regulation Committee.
- Greater clarity that the County Council will use its discretion to contact relevant residents and businesses (including the minerals and waste industry) during Development Plan Document production and a commitment to set up and maintain an "opt-in" consultee list – in response to concerns raised by Hughes Craven Ltd and the Robert Doughty Consultancy Ltd.

Appendix B also includes a number of proposed minor modifications to improve the document's presentation, amend typographical errors and to reflect its status as the proposed final document. These have been incorporated into the Proposed SCI attached as Appendix C.

1. Legal Issues:

Equality Act 2010

Under section 149 of the Equality Act 2010, the Council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:

- * Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Act
- * Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it
- * Foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

The relevant protected characteristics are age; disability; gender reassignment; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; and sexual orientation

Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to:

- * Remove or minimise disadvantages suffered by persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are connected to that characteristic
- Take steps to meet the needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are different from the needs of persons who do not share it
- * Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or in any other activity in which participation by such persons is disproportionately low

The steps involved in meeting the needs of disabled persons that are different from the needs of persons who are not disabled include, in particular, steps to take account of disabled persons' disabilities.

Having due regard to the need to foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to tackle prejudice, and promote understanding.

Compliance with the duties in section 149 may involve treating some persons more favourably than others.

The duty cannot be delegated and must be discharged by the decision-maker. To discharge the statutory duty the decision-maker must analyse all the relevant material with the specific statutory obligations in mind. If a risk of adverse impact is identified consideration must be given to measures to avoid that impact as part of the decision making process.

An Equality Impact Assessment has been carried out and attached to this report as Appendix D. No positive or adverse impacts have been identified, subject to the comments below:

The South Lincolnshire Blind Society has expressed concern that the Draft SCI gives little or no consideration of how the County Council will engage and consult with the blind population. The society state that thought as to how this group of people may provide positive and meaningful input should be one of the prime objectives. In particular, they point out that there is no mention in the consultation letter or Draft SCI to say what alternative formats will be available. The society does not, however, put forward any suggestions on how the Council could better engage and consult with the blind population.

In response, it is considered that the Draft SCI does provide a comprehensive suite of measures to maximise community engagement through the mechanisms that are available to the authority. For Development Plan Documents, paragraph 2.8 states that specific organisations targeting under represented and seldom heard groups will be identified with assistance from the Council's Community Engagement Team and utilised during consultation. The "general consultees" notified during DPD production includes bodies that represent the interests of the blind population, such as the South Lincolnshire Blind Society.

For planning applications, consultation and publicity is more targetted and

locationally specific. It is considered that the increased use of social media in addition to traditional methods is sufficient to involve all groups and individuals that may be affected by particular proposals.

Section 6 of the Draft SCI provides contact details for all enquiries regarding alternative languages and formats for the information in the document. It is, however, acknowledged that this information would be better placed at the beginning of the document to make it more prominent and to assist individuals utilising "text-to-speech" software. The Proposed SCI has been modified accordingly.

Joint Strategic Needs Analysis (JSNA and the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy (JHWS)

The Council must have regard to the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) and the Joint Health & Well Being Strategy (JHWS) in coming to a decision

It is considered that the Draft SCI would contribute to the aims of the JSNA and JHWS by improving the consultation/publicity given to planning matters that could affect the environment, thereby increasing the opportunity for representations to be made about the impacts and for remediation to be put in place.

Crime and Disorder

Under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, the Council must exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area (including anti-social and other behaviour adversely affecting the local environment), the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances in its area and re-offending in its area

This obligation has been considered but is not thought to be directly affected by the proposals in this report.

2. Conclusion

As previously stated, only 26 responses were received on the Draft SCI and about half of all the comments either expressed support or had no specific comments or objections. Where specific comments have been made, these have been considered together with the views of the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee and the Planning and Regulation Committee and, where appropriate, modifications have been incorporated into a Proposed SCI (Appendix C).

Some stakeholders, such as Gainsborough Town Council, would like the Council to go further in the use of press notices and social media. However, it is considered that the Proposed SCI strikes the right balance between ensuring effective

communication without overwhelming the public/stakeholders on issues which are unlikely to affect them, or would entail excessive costs for the Council.

It is considered that the approach set out in the Proposed SCI will promote an open and transparent process in terms of how the County Council will engage and consult the public and stakeholders when producing planning policy documents and determining planning applications.

3. Legal Comments:

Regulation 10A of the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) requires the Council to review its Statement of Community Involvement every 5 years.

Under s23(5) of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, a Statement of Community Involvement must be adopted by resolution of the authority. The final decision to adopt the new Statement is therefore reserved to full Council on the recommendation of the Executive.

The decision is consistent with the Policy Framework and it is within the remit of the Executive to decide whether to recommend the draft document referred to in the Report to the full Council for approval.

4. Resource Comments:

Accepting the recommendation for the Executive to endorse the Proposed Statement of Community Involvement and recommend its adoption to the full County Council should have no material impact on the budgets of the Council.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 Lincolnshire County Council is required to produce a Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) which outlines how the Council will engage and consult the public and stakeholders when producing planning policy documents associated with the Lincolnshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan, and when the public can have their say on the determination of planning applications that the Council deals with.
- 1.2 The requirement to produce an SCI is set out in the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004. The Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) also require SCI's to be reviewed every five years.
- 1.3 In Autumn 2018 the Council began work on a new SCI to replace the previous document which was last updated in 2014. A draft of the replacement SCI was published for public consultation in January 2019.
- 1.4 This Consultation Outcomes Statement sets out the responses received during the consultation on the draft replacement SCI and the County Council's response to them.

2. Draft Statement of Community Involvement (January 2019)

- 2.1 A Draft SCI was published by Lincolnshire County Council for a six week period of consultation between 21 January 2019 and 4 March 2019. This was a non-statutory consultation.
- 2.2 As set out in the national Planning Practice Guidance (PPG), there is no requirement for local planning authorities to consult when reviewing and updating their SCI. However, the County Council considered it important to enable communities and other stakeholders to have their say on the content of the new SCI and the proposed methods of engagement and consultation before it was adopted by the authority.
- 2.3 The consultation specifically included the following:
 - Written communication (by e-mail or letter) to 'specific' and 'general' consultation bodies as defined in the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012, informing them of the consultation and how to access the associated documentation;
 - Electronic copies of the Draft SCI and its accompanying response form made available to view and download from the County Council's website;

- Publicising the consultation by press release, and through the County Council's social media channels (including six adverts on Facebook).
- 2.4 A copy of the consultation letter and the response form that accompanied the Draft SCI are included in Appendix 1.

Responses Received

- 2.5 A total of 26 respondents made 34 individual comments on the Draft SCI. Respondents included statutory and voluntary bodies, local authorities, parish councils and planning consultants. About half of all comments received either expressed support or had no specific comments or objections in relation to the Draft SCI.
- 2.6 Of the 26 respondents, 15 were local authorities or parish councils, with two thirds of these organisations located outside of (adjacent to) Lincolnshire's boundary. Appendix 2 sets out all of the comments received in relation to the Draft SCI, along with the Council's responses where particular issues or concerns were identified.
- 2.7 In response to the comments received during consultation, the Council made a number of modifications to the Draft SCI. These modifications are incorporated into the final adopted SCI, and are detailed in a separate 'Schedule of Modifications' document which accompanies the adopted SCI.

3. Conclusion

3.1 Although not specifically required by legislation, the County Council has carried out comprehensive consultation and engagement on the replacement SCI prior to its adoption by the authority, in order to ensure the views of stakeholders and local communities have been taken into account. The outcome of this consultation and engagement has informed the contents of the final SCI.

1. Introduction

What is the Statement of Community Involvement (SCI)?

- 1.1 The Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) outlines how we (Lincolnshire County Council) will engage and consult the public and stakeholders when producing planning policy documents associated with the Lincolnshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan, and when the public can have their say on the determination of planning applications that we deal with.
- 1.2 The emphasis on consultation methods will be to promote an open and transparent process where communities and other stakeholders are encouraged to be involved in and have greater ownership of the decisions being made. Although getting involved does not guarantee that we will make changes or decisions that reflect everyone's views, our aim is to ensure that we explain appropriately why we have made particular decisions.
- 1.3 The requirement to produce an SCI is set out in the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004. This SCI replaces the County Council's previous SCI which was updated in 2014. The Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) - hereafter referred to as the '2012 Regulations' - require SCI's to be reviewed every five years.
- 1.4 The Localism Act 2011 puts engaging with local communities to shape the places where they want to live, work and play at the heart of the planning system. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) recognises that early, proportionate and effective engagement and collaboration with communities, local organisations, businesses, infrastructure providers and operators, and statutory consultees is essential to provide the framework on which local communities and planning authorities prepare effective local and neighbourhood plans.

Consultation and Engagement Methods

- 1.5 Consultation and engagement methods will be chosen to make them as relevant and effective as possible based on the different stages of the planning process. The County Council's website is our preferred method for both sharing information and receiving responses and will be used as widely as possible. Where this is not possible, letters will be sent to relevant parties informing them of opportunities to participate, and written representations will be welcomed.
- 1.6 We recognise how important it is for interested parties to be kept up to date. We therefore place great emphasis on ensuring our 'Planning' web pages are updated on a regular basis.
- 1.7 All comments submitted to us in response to consultations on planning policy documents and planning applications will be processed in accordance with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), and as set out in the

Planning Services Privacy Notice available on the County Council's website: <u>www.lincolnshire.gov.uk</u>.

Community Engagement Strategy, 2018 – 2023

- 1.8 The County Council's Community Engagement Team is a specialist group who provide support to both staff and communities in the preparation and operation of engagement and consultation exercises, to ensure good quality engagement occurs and to help inform people about what engagement is taking place. The Community Engagement Team is responsible for producing the Council's 'Community Engagement Strategy', the most recent of which covers the period 2018 to 2023 and is available on the County Council's website.
- 1.9 Some of the key aims of the Strategy are as follows:
 - to ensure the Council's engagement is effective, inclusive and has genuine influence
 - use clear language wherever the Council informs, consults or involves the community
 - ensure feedback is provided on all consultation and involvement undertaken
 - work with town and parish council's and various organisations to provide support so communities can develop and be actively involved.
- 1.10 Planning Services have worked closely with the Community Engagement Team throughout the preparation of this SCI.

2. Development Plan Documents (DPDs) – Lincolnshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan

- 2.1 Lincolnshire County Council is responsible for the production, monitoring and review of a **Minerals and Waste Local Plan**, comprising one or more 'Development Plan Documents' (DPDs). DPDs form part of the statutory development plan for the County and, under planning law, applications must be determined in accordance with the development plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise.
- 2.2 At the time of publication of this SCI the Minerals and Waste Local Plan is comprised of two separate DPDs: a Core Strategy and Development Management Policies document (CSDMP), adopted June 2016; and a Site Locations document (SLD), adopted December 2017. The 2012 Regulations require Local Plans to be reviewed at least every five years. This chapter sets out how we will involve the community and stakeholders in the production of DPDs to replace or supplement the existing documents.
- 2.3 A timetable for the Minerals and Waste Local Plan is set out in the County Council's Minerals and Waste Development Scheme which is reviewed website: the public regularly and available to on our www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/mineralsandwaste. Up-to-date information showing the state of the Council's compliance with the timetable set out in the Minerals and Waste Development Scheme is reported in the Authority Monitoring Reports, also available on our website.

Who will be involved?

- 2.4 In line with the requirements of the 2012 Regulations, when producing DPDs to update our Minerals and Waste Local Plan, the Council must legally consult 'Specific' and 'General' consultation bodies who are considered to have an interest in the proposed Plan:
 - Specific consultation bodies are statutory consultation groups, specified in the 2012 Regulations, that are often knowledgeable in certain subjects (e.g. the Environment Agency on flooding matters and utilities companies which operate in the County).
 - General consultation bodies include a wide range of other groups and organisations such as voluntary bodies, special interest groups (e.g. those that represent the interests of seldom heard groups).
- 2.5 The Council must also consult local residents and businesses within the area (including, for example, the mineral and waste industry) where considered appropriate. We will use discretion to identify the relevant interested parties to consult at different stages of DPD production. We will also contact any interested parties that have specifically 'opted in' to receive e-mail notifications about minerals and waste policy matters.

2.6 In addition to those identified above who will be contacted and made aware of consultations, any individual, business or organisation is welcome to participate at any stage of the consultation process. In order to promote greater community participation and to meet the needs of different communities, a variety of methods are likely to be used at various stages of the plan making process.

Involvement of Seldom Heard Groups

- 2.7 All sections of the community with an interest in a particular area will be engaged. Particular effort will be made to identify and engage underrepresented and seldom heard groups in Lincolnshire, including those with the following protected characteristics: age; disability; gender reassignment; marriage and civil partnership; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; sexual orientation. Within a sparsely populated county such as Lincolnshire, it is also important to ensure the involvement of groups including rural communities suffering from isolation.
- 2.8 Challenges encountered by the above groups range from accessibility to venues, language barriers, social differences and types of media being used. Specific organisations aimed at targeting these groups, identified with assistance from the Council's Community Engagement Team, will be utilised for consultation purposes; appropriate locations and a variety of media employed.

Duty to Cooperate

2.9 In addition to the specified stakeholders and groups identified above, the Localism Act 2011 introduced the 'Duty to Cooperate', which requires Local Planning Authorities such as Lincolnshire County Council to engage and cooperate on an ongoing basis with neighbouring authorities and other bodies and organisations in relation to strategic and cross-boundary matters. The 2012 Regulations specify a list of Duty to Cooperate bodies that we are required to engage with. In conjunction with the production of DPDs we will produce supporting documents to demonstrate how we have met the Duty to Cooperate. These are likely to take the form of statements of common ground or similar, and will be available alongside all other supporting documents.

When and how the community and stakeholders will be involved?

2.10 The key stages of preparation of DPDs are prescribed by the 2012 Regulations. Below is a summary of the stages that interested parties can get involved in, and how we intend to consult them. Where possible and appropriate, we will go beyond the minimum requirements to promote greater community participation.

Preparation of a DPD (Regulation 18)

- 2.11 During the early stages of evidence gathering and preparation of a DPD, we are required to notify specified bodies or persons of the subject of the document to be prepared, and invite them to make comments about what it should contain.
- 2.12 The number of consultations carried out at Regulation 18 stage is at the discretion of the County Council, and so may vary depending on the nature and complexity of the DPD being prepared. Regulation 18 consultation often comprises two separate stages: an 'Issues and Options' stage to scope out the key themes to be covered; and a further consultation on the 'Preferred Approach' subsequently identified, enabling views to be put forward on a 'Draft' document prior to the next stages of production. For less complex documents, there may only be the need for a single Regulation 18 consultation.
- 2.13 The table below sets out the minimum requirements for community involvement at Regulation 18 stage(s), and those measures we will utilise above and beyond these minimum requirements:

Publication of a DPD (Regulation 19)

2.14 After considering the responses received during the previous stage(s) in relation to the formulation of a 'Draft' document, the next stage is the production of a 'Proposed Submission' or 'Publication Draft' of the DPD being prepared. This will be the 'final' version of the DPD that we propose to submit to the Secretary of State.

- 2.15 Regulation 19 requires the Proposed Submission version of a DPD, along with accompanying 'proposed submission documents', to be published and made available for a period of formal public consultation to allow the local community and interested parties to make representations on the 'soundness' and legal compliance of the proposed final version of the document.
- 2.16 The 'proposed submission documents' that accompany the DPD will include a statement summarising issues raised in responses received during Regulation 18 consultation(s) and how these were taken into account in the final document. Unfortunately, it will not be possible to reply to each individual person or respond to every comment raised, but we will ensure all comments received are carefully considered.
- 2.17 The table below sets out the minimum requirements for community involvement at Regulation 19 stage, and those measures we will utilise above and beyond these minimum requirements:

Submission of a DPD (Regulation 22)

2.18 Following Regulation 19 consultation, we will submit the DPD to the Secretary of State for independent examination. The DPD will be accompanied by a number of 'submission documents' which will include a statement providing a

summary of the main issues raised in any representations at Regulation 19 stage, along with copies of the representations received.

- 2.19 A copy of the 'submission documents' and associated information will be made available on our website. In addition, appropriate submission documents will be made available at the County Council's principal office, and the main offices of District/Borough Councils. A statement highlighting that the above documents are available, and where they can be inspected will also be available at the above locations.
- 2.20 We will notify (by letter or e-mail) each of the 'general' and 'specific' consultation bodies previously invited to make representations at Regulation 18 stage, that the submission documents are available for inspection and the places and times they can be inspected, along with anyone else who has specifically asked to be notified when the DPD is submitted.

Examination of a DPD (Regulation 24)

- 2.21 A Planning Inspector will be appointed by the Secretary of State to carry out the independent examination of the DPD. The Planning Inspector will carefully consider any representations made at Regulation 19 stage as part of the examination process.
- 2.22 Details of the Examination will be made available on our website, at the County Council's principal office, and District/Borough Council main offices. Stakeholders that made formal representations at Regulation 19 stage will be individually notified at least six weeks before the opening of any public hearings. Furthermore, we will issue a press release and publicise the details of the upcoming hearings through the County Council's social media channels.
- 2.23 Any interested parties and members of the public can attend and observe the examination hearings, however the right to appear and be heard at examination hearings is generally limited to those persons who have made representations seeking a change to the Plan.
- 2.24 If, during examination, it is determined that modifications are necessary to make the DPD sound, if required by the Inspector, we will carry out additional consultation on the proposed modifications and forward the responses to the Inspector for consideration.

Adoption of a DPD (Regulation 26)

2.25 To complete the examination process, the Inspector will issue a report setting out whether the DPD is considered to be 'sound'. Upon receipt, we will publish the Inspector's Report on our website and make it available for inspection at the County Council's principal office, and at District/Borough Council main offices. We will notify anyone that requested to be informed of receipt of the Inspector's Report.

2.26 If the DPD is found sound and legally compliant and the County Council adopt the document (subject to the incorporation of any modifications recommended by the Inspector), a formal Adoption Statement will be issued and made available alongside the adopted DPD and other supporting documents on our website, at the County Council's principal office, and at District/Borough Council main offices. We will also send a copy of the Adoption Statement to any person that requested to be notified of the adoption of the DPD. Furthermore, we will issue a press release and publicise the details of the adoption through the County Council's social media channels. Amongst other things, the Adoption Statement will detail any modifications made to the DPD, and will set out a six week period for legal challenge which follows adoption of a DPD.

Sustainability Appraisal / Strategic Environmental Assessment

2.27 Legislation requires a DPD to go through a process of Sustainability Appraisal (SA) and Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA). The purpose of an SA is to promote sustainable development through the integration of social, environmental and economic considerations into the preparation of planning policy documents. The SA incorporates a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) carried out under the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004. When required, an SA/SEA will be consulted on throughout the plan-making process, at the same time as the document itself. Relevant stakeholders will also be consulted on the 'scope' of the SA/SEA at the start of the document preparation.

Council Committees

- 2.28 Decisions and recommendations on draft policy documents for consultation and recommendations for adoption are made by one or more of the following:
 - Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee
 - The Executive.
- 2.29 The decision to adopt a document is taken by a meeting of the full County Council.

Equality Impact Analysis

2.30 The County Council is committed to promoting equality. An Equality Impact Analysis will be carried out on all relevant DPDs in order to ensure polices do not discriminate against individuals or groups of people with protected characteristics. It is also a key objective to make certain there is equal opportunity for all members of the community to become involved in any of the various stages of plan production or the planning application process.

3. Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs)

What is a SPD?

- 3.1 Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs) add further detail to the policies set out in Development Plan Documents (DPDs). They can be used to provide further guidance for development on specific sites, or on particular issues, such as design. SPDs are capable of being a material consideration in planning decisions but are not part of the 'development plan' (they are not subject to independent examination and do not carry the same status as DPDs). SPDs should be prepared only where necessary.
- 3.2 Given their role and status, the requirements for community involvement in the production of SPDs are not as broad as those for DPDs. The 2012 Regulations set out the requirements for producing SPDs, which are summarised below.

Who will be consulted on SPDs?

3.3 The County Council may prepare SPDs at any time, but is not obliged to do so. When preparing an SPD, any individual, business, organisation or group is welcome to partake in the public consultation stage(s). However, the Council may choose to specifically notify those individuals, businesses, organisations and groups which it thinks will have a particular interest in the SPD and invite them to comment.

When the Council will consult on SPDs

3.4 The nature and extent of consultation during production of SPDs is at the discretion of the County Council, but is likely to include at least one period of consultation on a 'Draft' document, or informal engagement with relevant stakeholders. Prior to the adoption of an SPD, we are also required to make the SPD available on our website, at the County Council's principal office, and at other places considered appropriate, for a minimum period of four weeks to allow any interested parties to make representations on the document ('other places' will include relevant District/Borough Council main offices). At this stage, the SPD will be accompanied by a 'Consultation Statement' detailing the persons and organisations we consulted when preparing the SPD, a summary of the main issues raised, and how these have been addressed in the SPD. As with DPDs, only comments relating to planning considerations will be taken into account.

How the Council will consult on a SPD

- 3.5 Consultation methods will be similar to those used for DPDs. When consulting on SPDs the Council will:
 - Make consultation documents and associated information available on our website.

- Issue consultation letters/emails to parties who we consider will have a particular interest in the SPD, to bring consultations to their attention and inform them of how and when they can make comments.
- Where appropriate, issue a press release to bring the consultation to the attention of the wider public and inform them of how and when they can make comments.
- Where appropriate, utilise social media to publicise consultations.
- Where appropriate, hold public drop-in sessions and/or stakeholder workshops in suitable locations.
- Enable individuals and organisations to submit comments either in writing via post, or electronically via email.

Adoption of an SPD

3.6 As soon as the County Council adopts an SPD, we will produce an Adoption Statement, which will be made available alongside the SPD on our website, at the County Council's principal office, and at District/Borough Council main offices. We will also send a copy of the Adoption Statement to those that have asked to be informed of the Adoption of the SPD. The Adoption Statement will include details of provisions available for judicial review as set out in the 2012 Regulations (as amended). It will also detail any modifications made to the SPD as a result of representations received. The Adoption of an SPD may also be publicised through the issuing of a press release and through the County Council's social media channels.

4. Neighbourhood Plans

- 4.1 The Localism Act 2011 introduced a new form of community planning entitled Neighbourhood Plans. They allow Parish/Town Councils or Neighbourhood Forums (authorised groups of local individuals in areas with no parishes) to prepare statutory Neighbourhood Development Plans against which planning applications will be assessed. As Neighbourhood Plans and Orders are not prepared by the County Council, this SCI cannot prescribe what methods of community engagement they must follow. However, we will expect groups preparing Neighbourhood Plans to meet the requirements set out in legislation and to follow wherever possible the general principles and techniques set out in this SCI.
- 4.2 Whilst the County Council's Planning Services do not have specific duties or resources in relation to Neighbourhood Planning, the Minerals and Waste Local Plan is part of the statutory 'development plan' for the County, and therefore we will endeavour to ensure that Neighbourhood Plans fulfil their duties and give due regard to the Minerals and Waste Local Plan during their preparation. Where resources allow, we will endeavour, on request, to provide comments and advice to Neighbourhood Plans that are located in proximity to existing, proposed and safeguarded minerals and waste sites and areas.

5. Planning Applications

- 5.1 We are responsible for determining planning applications for mineral extraction and associated development, waste management proposals and the Council's own development sites (e.g. schools, libraries, fire stations, highway schemes and waste recycling sites).
- 5.2 All other types of planning application (e.g. housing and commercial development) are dealt with by the relevant District/Borough Council.
- 5.3 Full details of how to submit a planning application, including details of all the information and documents that must be submitted alongside an application are available on the 'Planning Applications' pages of our website: <u>www.lincolnshire.gov.uk</u>.
- 5.4 Set out below is how we will handle and process any applications received and how you can comment on them.

Pre-application engagement

- 5.5 Applicants are encouraged to involve the local community when developing their proposals¹. Such engagement can be beneficial to both the applicant and the community, as it can foster transparency and enable proposals to respond to local needs and desires.
- 5.6 Before applying for planning permission applicants are therefore encouraged to engage with the local community, have due regard to any comments and views received and (where possible) make changes to their proposal before submitting an application. When submitting their application, applicants should provide details of the consultation undertaken and how this has shaped the final proposal.

How to find out about a planning application in your area?

- 5.7 When a planning application is received we will publish details of the application on our Planning Register which can be found on the 'Planning Applications' pages of our website. Specifically we will publish details of the nature of the development; location; details of how comments on the application can be made and the deadline for comments to be submitted. All applications and comments received will be published in accordance with the terms and conditions as set out in the Planning Services Privacy Notice on our website.
- 5.8 We are required to publicise and notify the public on certain types of planning application that we deal with. The Town & Country Planning (Development

¹ At present it is only a legal requirement to undertake pre-application consultation for development involving an installation for the harnessing of wind power for energy production where it involves either the installation of more than 2 turbines or the hub height of any turbine exceeds 15 metres.

Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 sets out the minimum standards to be adopted and we use a range of different methods which include site and press notices, neighbour notification letters, our website and social media. These methods build upon the minimum standards set out in legislation and a description of each of these methods is as follows:

Table 3: Methods of Notification and Publicity

Site Notices	These will be displayed for most types of planning application and are typically posted on or near to the site (e.g. on fences, gates, lamp posts or free-standing notice boards, etc). If a development covers a large area several site notices may be posted in the locality. The site notice describes the proposed development and gives information on how and when people can send comments to us.
Press Notice	For certain types of application a press notice will also be placed in a local newspaper ² . The press notice will advertise the proposed development and give information on how and when people can send comments to us.
Neighbour Notifications	Neighbouring residents and properties near to a site will be notified where a proposed development has the potential to impact upon them. Planning Officers have discretion to decide which neighbours to notify and so this may vary depending upon the size, scale and nature of the development. However, anyone can comment on a planning application regardless of whether or not they received a notification and therefore we welcome and encourage anyone that thinks they may be affected by a development to send comments to us.
Planning Register / Website	Most applications will be published on our Planning Register where details of the application are displayed, copies of any plans/drawings and supporting documentation as well as comments received from consultees and the public can also be viewed. Details of how comments on the application can be made and the deadline for comments to be submitted are also given.
Social Media (Facebook)	For certain types of application we will use social media to notify the public that an application has been received. These posts will contain basic information about an application and give a link to where more information can be found, including where and how to send comments to us. Any comments made directly on social media will not be accepted and therefore will not be taken into account. For larger scale or complex applications we may use social media in a more direct way to identify and target interested parties and communities.
Word of mouth	This can be an effective and common way in which information is shared. We recognise this and therefore encourage people that have been notified or that are aware of an application to share this information with their neighbours and communities. We therefore welcome comments from anyone that feels they may be affected by a development or have comments they wish us to take into account.

² Newspapers utilised will be reviewed regularly. At the time of publication of this SCI, this comprised the Lincolnshire Echo, and where this newspaper is not available, either the Lincolnshire Free Press in the south of the county, or the Skegness Standard in the east.

However, anyone proposing to send comments to us should first
familiarise themselves with the application and therefore ensure their
comments and views are relevant to the proposal and not based or
formed on the basis of rumour or misinformation.

5.9 The table below sets out how different types of planning application we deal with will be publicised and which of the above methods we will use to notify the public and local communities. These standards are a minimum and may be expanded upon depending upon the nature of the development and/or circumstances of the case.

- 1 For the County Council a 'major development' is defined in the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2015 and is an application for one of the following:-
 - any development involving the winning or working of minerals or the use of land for mineral working deposits;
 - waste development;
 - development involving a building(s) with a floor space of 1,000 square metres or more;
 - any other development of a site of one hectare or more.
- 2 Minor development is any development falling outside the definition of major development, but does not include applications for non-material amendments or for the discharge of conditions. Such applications are not subject to publicity.
- 3 For works affecting only the interior of Grade II Listed Buildings, details will be placed on our website only.
- 4 Where the County Council has advised that prior approval is required.
- 5.10 Once a planning application has been validated we will endeavour to determine the application within the following timeframes:
 - eight weeks in the case of applications for minor development, applications for hazardous substance consent and advertisements which require express consent and prior approval applications for nonmicrogeneration solar panels;
 - 13 weeks in the case of applications for major development (all waste and mineral applications and some County Council applications);
 - 16 weeks for applications that are supported by an Environmental Statement; and
 - 28 days for prior notifications relating to proposed demolition of buildings and agricultural development.
- 5.11 Legislation sets the minimum time to comment depending on the type of application:
 - 21 days for a standard application (plus where a bank holiday is included in this time period an extra day per each bank holiday);
 - 30 days for an application accompanied by an environmental statement;
 - An additional 30 days when we re-consult following receipt of further information to support an environmental statement.
- 5.12 It is also our practice to re-consult and give a further 14 days on which to respond if significant changes are made to any planning proposals which are under consideration.
- 5.13 Where neighbours are notified in respect of prior notifications for agricultural buildings and the demolition of buildings the period for response will be reduced to 14 days because of the tighter timescales for dealing with these types of notification.

How do I comment on an application?

- 5.14 Any individual, business, organisation or group is able to submit comments on any planning application either electronically via the Planning Register on our website or in writing to our Planning Services section. All comments and representations must be received in writing by us within the period specified. We will, however, still take into account any late comments received after the specified date if they are received prior to a decision on the application being made. A verbal or anonymous written comment will not be accepted and therefore will not be taken into account.
- 5.15 We can only take comments into account that relate to planning considerations: comments on none planning matters such as the impact of the development on property values, or loss of view for example, cannot be taken into consideration. Examples of the planning considerations that we can take into account can be found on the 'Planning Applications' pages of our website.

Who else do we consult?

5.16 We consult a wide range of groups and organisations on planning proposals by e-mail or letter before making a decision, including the relevant town/parish council/meeting or Neighbourhood Forum. The groups and organisations consulted will vary according to the type and location of the development. The requirements are set out in legislation and are explained in National Planning Practice Guidance.

How do we make a planning decision?

- 5.17 For the majority of applications, a decision will be reached by a Planning Officer (known as a delegated decision). The criteria for those applications that are delegated to Planning Officers are set out in the County Council's constitution on our website.
- 5.18 Should a proposal require determination at the Planning and Regulation Committee all those who made comments on the application will be advised of the date the application will be brought to the Committee. Further details on our Public Speaking arrangements at Committee can be found on the 'Planning Applications' pages of our website.

How do I find out about a decision?

5.19 We notify all those who made representations on a development either in writing, by email or in some instances via the local press. All decisions are recorded on the Planning Register held by the relevant District/Borough Council. Copies of our decision notices are also published on our Planning Register.

Equality Act 2010

The Equality Act 2010 applies to both our workforce and our customers. Under the Equality Act 2010, decision makers are under a personal duty, to have due (that is proportionate) regard to the need to protect and promote the interests of persons with protected characteristics.

Protected characteristics

The protected characteristics under the Act are: age; disability; gender reassignment; marriage and civil partnership; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; sexual orientation.

Section 149 of the Equality Act 2010

Section 149 requires a public authority to have due regard to the need to:

- Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, and any other conduct that is prohibited by/or under the Act
- Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share relevant protected characteristics and persons who do not share those characteristics

The purpose of Section 149 is to get decision makers to consider the impact their decisions may or will have on those with protected characteristics and by evidencing the impacts on people with protected characteristics decision makers should be able to demonstrate 'due regard'.

Decision makers duty under the Act

Having had careful regard to the Equality Impact Analysis, and also the consultation responses, decision makers are under a personal duty to have due regard to the need to protect and promote the interests of persons with protected characteristics (see above) and to:-

Consultation was carried out on the Draft SCI (v0.1) between 21 January 2019 and 4 March 2019. The response form for the consultation included a question asking respondents to identify any perceived impacts on protected characteristics.

Only one representation was received from a body specifically representing people with a protected characteristic. This was from the South Lincolnshire Blind Society that expressed concerns that the draft version of the SCI (v0.1) gives little consideration of how the County Council will engage and consult with the blind population within the County. The Society states that consideration as to how this group of people may provide positive and meaningful input should be one of the prime objectives. It also states that there is no mention within the consultation letter or Draft SCI to say what alternative formats will be available. The Society has not, however, put forward any recommendations to assist the Council to better engage and consult with the blind population within the County.

In response, it is considered that the Draft SCI does propose a comprehensive suite of measures to maximise community engagement through the mechanisms that are available to the authority. For Development Plan Documents (DPD), paragraph 2.8 notes that specific organisations targeting under represented and seldom heard groups will be identified with assistance from the Council's Community Engagement Team and utilised during consultation. In any event, the 'general consultees' notified during DPD production include bodies that represent the interests of the blind population, such as the South Lincolnshire Blind Society.

For planning applications, consultation and publicity is more targeted and locationally specific. It is considered that the increased use of social media in addition to traditional methods is sufficient to involve all groups and individuals that may be affected by particular proposals.

It is however acknowledged that this information would be better placed at the beginning of the document, particularly to assist those individuals utilising 'text-to-speech' software. Summary:

Recently completed coastal projects, the new Gibraltar Point Visitor Centre at Skegness and the North Sea Observatory at Chapel St Leonards, have shown that if the facilities are good enough you can attract visitors to the Lincolnshire Coast at any time of the year. This project will look at adding another new quality tourist facility in the heart of the Coastal Country Park, close to the beach at Huttoft, just South of Sutton on Sea.

The project will be funded by Lincolnshire County Council and the GL LEP.

Subject to receiving planning permission this Autumn the project will start on site early in 2020 and be finished and open to the public in June 2020.

The building will replace an existing redundant boat shed, owned by Lincolnshire County Council. Currently there is no electricicity on the site, so the scheme will include a new connection between the site and the nearest mains electricity on the main road.

The new building will contain a high quality cafe, a rooftop viewing deck with a glass balustrade and an external ground level deck for hosting larger pop-up food and other events. The building will have floor to ceiling windows facing inland and North to Sutton on Sea. Given its isolated location, these windows will be protected with shutters when the building is not open.

The new building will be let to a commercial enterprise, at a commercial rent. They will be responsible for the maintenance of the building and the neighbouring public toilets, which will be refurbished as part of the project.

Actions Required:

Members of the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee are invited to:

- 1) Consider and comment on the proposals for the Huttoft Boat Shed Visitor Centre and Cafe, and;
- 2) Endorse that the Executive Councillor for Economy and Place approves the required development for the project in line with the project delivery timetable.

1. Background

Evidence for need

In 2016 the Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership (GLNP) identified major challenges in progressing initiatives to grow coastal nature tourism. There is a perception of the coast being a series of resorts catering for the mass market. There is also a lack of infrastructure for tourism, particularly good quality accommodation and eating places compared to competitors such as North Norfolk

Opportunity

The GLNP estimated the current value of nature based tourism and leisure activity to GL could be as much as £325 million, of which £51 million is associated with holidays and day trips where engaging with wildlife is the primary purpose.

The GLNP identified a need to create flagships for further development work to act as 'clusters' to create additional critical mass in terms of marketing the destination.

This project at Huttoft looks at adding a new coastal 'flagship'. It will build on the success of other successful projects recently completed by LCC, the new Gibraltar Point visitor centre and the North Sea Observatory at Chapel St Leonards. These schemes have received a number of design awards, have improved the food and information offer on the coast, attract over 150,000 visitors a year, and have raised the bar in what visitor expect when they visit the coast.

It will be in a prime position bring together a wide range of existing coastal activities and promote new ones. Including :- organised walks and beach/sea safaris; sea dipping; whale, seal and dolphin watching events; beach cleaning & events raising the awareness of plastic pollution; promoting the new National Coastal Footpath. It will also host satellite art exhibitions and activities in conjunction with the North Sea Observatory Gallery.

Location

Huttoft lies within the Lincolnshire Coastal Country Park. A narrow road connects the main coast road to the car park on Huttoft Terrace. The Terrace is popular with visitors who can park and enjoy an uninterrupted view of the sea.

Next to the dunes is a building, owned by LCC, originally used by a boat club to house a tractor. The club disbanded some years ago and the building is no longer used.

LCC have been looking at alternative uses for the site. Given the need for additional tourist facilities and the success of other coastal projects it is proposed to replace it with a building incorporating a café, visitor facilities and public toilets.

Building design

The building is designed to be no larger than the footprint of the existing building (a requirement of the Environment Agency). So to maximise its potential it will have a rooftop viewing deck and a second ground level timber deck on the landward side. The internal layout has been designed to reflect lessons learnt from other recently completed projects. So room for tables and chairs will be maximised and there will be a foyer to protect customers from the elements when the doors are in operation. To maximise the space inside the building the project will include the refurbishment of the existing public toilets next door (currently owned by East Lindsey District Council) and then incorporating these within the project.

There will be floor to ceiling windows facing West (to the Wolds) and North (to Sutton on Sea). These will be protected by shutters when the building is not open.

The existing building is not connected to mains electricity. So the project includes linking the building to the nearest electric supply, 1000m away on the main road.

Local issues

Sand removal – Most issues caused by sand blowing from the beach effect the parking terrace not the area around the proposed café and the removal of sand from the parking terrace will be unaffected by this project.

Terrace car parking charging – the project does not prevent any future change to charging for visitors using the terrace. The new electric supply will also future proof the site should parking meters etc. need to be installed in the future.

Anti-social behaviour on the terrace – during the consultation on the project the parish council and local members have said that anti-social behaviour on the terrace has decreased in recent years. But having a new building in this location should help to deter anti-social behaviour in the area.

Future ownership and maintenance

The building will remain in LCC's ownership. It will be be run by a commercial operator, creating new jobs and a new SME. The tenant will be charged a commercial rent and be expected to maintain the building and public toilets.

This new business will be encouraged to provide seasonal food, sourced locally. They will also employ permanent, part-time, seasonal and voluntary staff from the local area and support numerous other smaller local companies.

2. Conclusion

Other coastal projects recently completed show that if the facilities are good enough, you can attract people to visit the Lincolnshire Coast any time of the year. They have helped overcome negative perceptions of the Lincolnshire Coast and can help other businesses see the potential of investing on the coast.

The new Huttoft Boat Shed Cafe builds on the progress already made towards the sort of critical mass needed to make a significant impact.

Consultation has taken place with East Lindsey District Council, Huttoft Parish Council, the Environment Agency and the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust.

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
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
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

Subject:	Update on the Business LincoInshire Update on the Business LincoInshire Growth Hub's ScaleUp Provision

Summary:

This report provides an update on the ScaleUp business support activity to date. The BEIS Government Department has requested that Growth Hubs (the business support arm of GLLEP and LCC) provide targetted support to help businesses that display scaleup characteristics achieve further rapid growth.

A 'scaleup' is an enterprise with average annualised growth in employees or turnover greater than 20 per cent over a three-year period, and with more than 10 employees at the start. Analysis of local business data reveals that there is a current client group of 222 businesses in Greater Lincolnshire who meet the criteria.

The Business Lincolnshire Growth Hub has developed a tailored offer to help Greater Lincolnshire's high growth businesses to reach their full potential. Businesses have to demostrate growth, drive and ambition in order to access this programme. A portfolio of ScaleUp business offers is currently being piloted with 59 businesses, which are either existing scaleups or potential scale ups.

The aim is to help drive forward growth of businesses that have the capability, capacity and desire to scale up their business. This will ultimately lead to greater productivity, employment and economic growth for Lincolnshire.

The ScaleUp Programme is currently funded out of the BEIS Government Department Growth Hub funding and in 2019-22 part of it will be integrated in to the new European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) Phase 2 programme offer.

Actions Required:

The members of the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee are invited to:

1) Consider and comment on the current ScaleUp provision offer and activity to date and whether the County Council should continue to focus resources on providing tailored support to a specific group of businesses, or broaden our

approach to smaller less ambitious businesses;

- Consider how the County Council can use the growth stories from our ScaleUp partners to actively promote that Lincolnshire has a robust ecosystem in place to support growth, and;
- 3) Highlight any recommendations for consideration by the Executive Councillor for Economy and Place.

1. Background

The Business Lincolnshire Growth Hub (the business support arm of GLLEP and LCC) is keen to support the development and growth of our high growth businesses. Our funders, the BEIS government department, have asked that we proactively target these businesses and develop a ScaleUp Service to support them to develop at a greater pace due to tailored interventions. This will ultimately lead to greater productivity, employment and economic growth for Lincolnshire.

The Growth Hub has a clear role to play in identifying and targeting those businesses with the potential to scale up with support and inspiring, motivating and encouraging those already scaling up, and linking both with the right services. There is also a need to make sure that scale-up processes are successful and provide sustained impact.

2. ScaleUp Definition

A business can be classified as a 'Scale-Up Business' using the definition provided below:

- Minimum of **10 employees** at the start of the engagement.
- Achieved minimum £500k turnover in last year (operating for at least 3 years).
- Potential/aspiration to grow turnover and/or profit by a minimum of 20% (per annum) over a 3 year period

And/or (depending on local economic priorities) Pre ScaleUp businesses that have the potential to grow:

- Minimum of **5 employees** at the start of the engagement
- Achieved minimum £250k turnover in last year
- Potential/aspiration to grow turnover and/or profit by a minimum of **50% per** annum over a 3 year period

Why are they important: the number of scaleups in the UK lags behind the US and other leading economies. Boosting the scale up population by just 1% could create 228,000 jobs and add £38bn to GVA2¹. Therefore ScaleUp businesses are critically important to economic growth. If we increase the population of ScaleUp businesses we will create a step change in economic performance across Lincolnshire.

The 2014 ScaleUp Report suggests that a more robust ecosystem needs to be developed by the government, local authorities and universities.

The focus should be on;

- Targeting, supporting, promoting and reporting on scale-up gap closure
- Accessing talent
- Developing ScaleUp leadership
- Increasing customer sales at home and abroad
- Financing scale-ups
- Accessing infrastructure

The Business Lincolnshire Growth Hub and the LEP has identified the need for enhanced provision of support for existing and future 'high growth' businesses.

3. ScaleUp Provision

During 2018/19 a pilot ScaleUp programme has been led by a dedicated ScaleUp Account Manager, Noreen Read. The Account Manager provides expertise and guidance to local businesses, provides access on to the Hub's fully funded programmes as well as help to develop a strategic business plan for future growth. The Account Manager is able to provide information on the range of support offers businesses can access depending on their stage of growth, business size, and preferred learning style.

The ScaleUp Programme is currently funded out of the BEIS Government Department Growth Hub funding and in 2019-22 part of it will be integrated in to the new European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) Phase 2 programme offer.

3.1. Identifying ScaleUps

Business Lincolnshire Growth Hub has used data from the Scale Up Institute, MINT, HMRC and DueDil data sets to identify potential Scale Up businesses in the region. These have been cross referenced and de-duplicated to form the target lists.

Business referrals area also received via intermediaries (banks, accountants) who are referring their clients into the programmes.

All growth businesses will be targeted but there is a desire to focus on the LEP core sectors – Agri Tech, Manufacturing, and Renewable Energy.

There are 38,240 VAT and PAYE registered businesses in Greater Lincolnshire (Table 1). Of which nearly 4,360 employ over 10 employees. Based on analysis of the businesses which are in a position to scale up, (10+ employees, 20% growth for 3 years) our MINT data reveals that there are around 112 businesses in Greater Lincolnshire which currently show the characteristics of a scale up business and there are 110 businesses who should be classed as potential scale up businesses (5+ employees, 50% growth for 3 years).

Therefore we have a client group of 222 businesses to work with, however should we focus our limited resources and focus on this specific group or broaden our approach to smaller less ambitious businesses?


The Growth Hub does provide direct support to all businesses dependant on their growth stage, but many of the programmes are bound by European Regional Development Funds (ERDF) which are constrained by a 12 hours support limit, lengthy administrative paperwork and rigid output requirements. The ScaleUp programme is funded via the BEIS funding which is flexible and can be used to meet market failure gaps in provision.

3.2. The Business Lincolnshire ScaleUp Programme offers

We have developed a mix and match range ScaleUp Programmes (as listed below) to support businesses who are either existing Scaleups (a business which is growing at a rate of more than 20% per year, for a continuous period of 3 years) or Future Scaleup's. We recognise that periods of high growth are exciting for a business, but they can come with challenges, such as identifying highly skilled employees to bring into a business, accessing growth finance, utilising the best leadership methods and adapting to new consumer markets. Therefore, the programmes have been designed to meet these needs.

The ScaleUp Programme offers: one to one guidance, leadership and management programmes, peer to peer networks, including coaching and mentoring support as well as pathways to National offers, the support will help rapid-growing businesses cope with the difficulties that increased demand can have in periods of high growth.

The Programme has been designed to facilitate that growth, offering a range of leadership and management programmes led by successful business entrepreneurs, specialist workshops (Finance Readiness, Management Style Profiling, Managing the Media etc) and supported with access to business coaching, exposure to a network of professional experts and mentoring through one-to-one support.



We have 3 pilot programmes running/due to run/or be repeated currently;

- **High Performance Leadership** (existing Scaleups)- Feb 2019 11 businesses attended
- ScaleUp Management and Leadership Programme (Future Scaleups) Oct 2018 - 12 businesses attended, Feb 2019 -12 businesses, April 2019 -12 business
- Business Leaders Peer to Peer Support and Mentoring (Future Scaleups) Sept 2018 12 businesses, February 12 businesses
- We have been making referrals in to the Goldman Sachs Programme- 3 businesses have been accepted to date
- Managing the media (open to all Scaleups)– March 2019 9 businesses
- Management Style Profiling (open to all Scaleups) 33 businesses
- Pathway into national programmes referrals to the Goldman Sachs 10,000 Small Businesses (12 businesses referred, 3 accepted on the 2019/20 programme, 3 withdrew, 1 unsuccessful and the rest have been ask to reapply for the next cohort)

In total 59 businesses have accessed the Scaleup provision during 2018-9. Noreen Read is currently recruiting the new cohorts for 2019/20.

Initial feedback from the programmes delivered to date has been overwhelmingly positive and have given the businesses a clear focus for action.

Baseline data and client feedback has been collected and 6 monthly monitoring is ongoing, however it is too early to provide impact data. We will continue to review the pilot programmes, assess the evaluation and roll out a formal programme.

3.3. Client Case Study

Optima Graphic Design Consultants Ltd, **Optima** offer a full-service **design** agency based in Lincoln, UK with a local, national and international client base eg Pipers Crisps, Branston Potatoes, Uncle Henry's, International Federation of Red Cross etc.

They are classed as an existing Scale Up business and participated on the High Performance Leadership Programme. They are part way through the support and their feedback is outlined below;

"The Extraordinary leadership Course was really great for our team as we plan the next phase of our business in our new office. It gave us space to think and share experiences, plan for the future and really focus our ideas. We networked with other fantastic local business's who are also aiming high.

As a Lincoln business, having access to such high level training and input really helps Optima and gives us more inspiration to aim even higher with everything we do. Thank you."

3.4. Team Lincolnshire Alignment Opportunity

There is an opportunity for us to facilitate aligning of the ScaleUp businesses with the Team Lincolnshire, its ethos, aim and members. The ScaleUp businesses are from all sectors and have a clear ambition to develop and grow, therefore it is an ideal opportunity to link this to the Team Lincolnshire ambassadors programme, whereby we can harness this drive and passion about Lincolnshire as a place to do business. A joint introduction event is currently being planned.

4. Future ScaleUp Provision

Alumni from the Lincolnshire programmes will be invited to join a peer to peer network and link with the other businesses who have accessed the programmes within the ScaleUp portfolio.

5. Next Steps for 2019

We are focusing on the following priorities for action:

- Increase the targeted marketing for new ScaleUp cohorts
- Host a ScaleUp event that showcases the ScaleUp businesses that have been through the pilot phase. This will celebrate the businesses and work of the programme as well as seek to attract new applicants.
- Procure a ScaleUp Alumni Network facilitator/programme
- Join up the ScaleUp Alumni with Team Lincolnshire members
- Develop a communications plan to use the growth stories from the ScaleUp businesses to spread the message that 'Lincolnshire is open for business'
- Evaluate and review existing ScaleUp provision and refine the offer

6. Conclusion

The Growth Hub's next phase is to evaluate the ScaleUp pilot programmes and roll out the service formally and continue to develop new business support services in market failure situations.

Summary:

This report describes progress against the indicators in the council business plan. Six indicators are reported, of which one is not achieved, one is improving but not achieved, one is achieved and two show measured progress.

Actions Required:

Members of the Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee are invited to:

- 1) Consider the performance against the indicators and highlight any recommendations, changes or actions for consideration; and,
- 2) Seek assurance from senior managers on how they will maintain and improve performance against the indicators.

1. Background

Six County Council business plan indicators for the environment are reported this quarter. Monitoring of flooding incidents within properties shows no reports for this quarter, indicating the continuation of unusually dry conditions during the early months of 2019. The annual target of properties protected from flooding by March 2019 has been achieved, significantly exceeding the target for the year.

It should be noted that the targets for 2017/18 and 2018/19 reflect the number of properties protected by Council-led schemes that were planned across the twoyear capital programme as a whole. This amounts to 161 properties better protected by the end of that period. It is expected that the flood risk incidents of June this year will lead to a revision of the target for this and following years.

Two indicators have not been met, although the percentage of household waste recycled shows an improved figure on the original end of year forecast as reported last quarter. As reported previously, the new Joint Municipal Waste Management Strategy, is expected to lead to the adoption of new indicators appropriate to the current national and international situation with regard to waste management.

2. Conclusion

Performance continues to be steady against the most relevant measures. Where performance is not meeting the indicators it is because the indicators are outdated, and work is in progress to replace these indicators.




About the latest performance


Increase recycling



Our Waste Collection Authorities (WCAs) continue to collect similar quantities in kerbside recycling collections. Unfortunately around 31% of what our WCAs collect from kerbside is predicted to be non-recyclable this year. We also experienced operational issues from a substantial fire at one of our contractors sites, which effected the tonnage of processed material in October and contributes to what is a reduction in overall tonnage.




About the latest performance

The overall total for 2018/19 of 42.07% is an improvement on the Quarter 3 year-end forecast (41.25%). The national recycling rate is also reducing and is down from 45.1% in 2016/17 to 44.8% in 2017/18 with initial estimates for 2018/19 indicating this downward trend is set to continue.

An increase in non-recyclables seen in the kerbside collections has reduced the amount of Mixed Dry Recycling (MDR) being sent for processing which has resulted in a lower recycling rate from last year. This contamination level is being addressed with the District Councils as part of the next MDR contract and the new Lincolnshire Waste Strategy.

The National Resource and Waste Strategy includes a commitment to review the current measurement metrics used to report recycling performance.






Reduce the risk of flooding

Flooding incidents within a property


This measure is calculated on the basis of the number of formal investigations undertaken by the County Council under section 19 of the Flood and Water Management Act 2010 where the incident involves flooding within a property from any source, although under the Act the County Council only has a responsibility for local flood risk i.e. from surface water, groundwater or ordinary watercourses. Lincolnshire County Council has interpreted a flooding incident to be any in which one or more domestic properties are flooded internally.

A smaller number of flooding incidents indicates a better performance.



About the latest performance

Monthly figures from the Environment Agency indicate that March 2019 rainfall was around the longterm average, with the previous two months being below average, notably so in some areas of Lincolnshire. This relatively benign period was naturally reflected in the surface water flood risk, as for the second quarter in a row there were no flood investigations started. This compares with a single investigation started in the same period last year, and brings the total number of investigations in 2018/19 to 21 (most of which were started in Q1 2018/19), compared with seven in 2017/18.



Flooding Incidents Within a Property

About the target

This measure is reported to provide context to the outcome reduce the risk of flooding. It is not appropriate to set a target for this measure.

About the target range

A target range is not applicable as this is a contextual measure.

About benchmarking

This measure is local to Lincolnshire as each Local Flood Authority (Unitary and County Councils) defines a flood incident as they consider appropriate and therefore is not benchmarked against any other area.






Reduce the risk of flooding

Properties protected from flooding

It is estimated that in Lincolnshire there are about 28,000 properties which have either been flooded in the past or are thought to be at risk from surface water flooding.

As outlined in the Lincolnshire Joint Flood Risk Management Strategy, in accordance with its duty to undertake improvement works to protect communities, the County Council as Lead Local Flood Authority has developed an ongoing programme of surface water flood risk management schemes. A higher number of properties protected from flooding indicates a better performance.



About the latest performance

The delivery of a major surface water flood alleviation scheme to protect 51 homes at Middle Rasen, together with a number of other minor schemes, contributed to the successful achievement of the annual target.

Historical information is provided in the graph above, as this is an annual measure.

About the target

It is estimated that in Lincolnshire there are about 28,000 properties which have either been flooded in the past or are thought to be at risk from surface water flooding.

As outlined in the Lincolnshire Joint Flood Risk Management Strategy, in accordance with its duty to undertake improvement works to protect communities, the County Council as Lead Local Flood Authority has developed an ongoing programme of surface water flood risk management schemes. The target for 2018/19 is to reduce the flood risk to 50 properties by carrying out flood alleviation works.

About the target range

There is a range in the target of +/- 10 properties. The reason for this is that the schemes in the future programme protect a range of properties, and as the programme is rolled out over the years there will be a consequent variation in the total number of properties protected. Other aspects which might influence the target include significant flood events and economic factors.

About benchmarking

The target is local to Lincolnshire and is not therefore bench marked against other Lead Local Flood Authorities.

This Quarter Environment & Economy has received 3 complaints. This is a decrease of 2 on last Quarter which resulted in a total of 5 complaints for the area. We see a decrease of 1 when comparing this to the same Quarter last year which saw 4 complaints received for the area.

Environmental management

This Quarter Environmental Management has received 0 complaints which is a decrease of 100% when 8 were received.

Flooding and Flood Risk

This Quarter there were 2 complaints in regards to flood risks reported to council which is an increase of 100% on the previous quarter. The council business plan contains four indictors relating to economic development: jobs created, businesses, assisted, qualifications achieved, and external funding generated.

Actions Required:

The Environment and Economy Scrutiny Committee are invited to consider and comment on the detail of performance contained in the report and recommend any changes or actions to the Executive Councillor for Economy and Place.

1. Background

Jobs created

741 jobs were created against a target of 360. This is due to several successful growth initiatives by foreign owned businesses in Lincolnshire, and also due to several smaller job investments by small and medium sized businesses. Small and medium sized businesses make up the majority of the county's business community, and the business advice programmes that are provided through the Business Lincolnshire growth hub have helped those businesses to grow their employment base.

Businesses assisted

1081 businesses were assisted against a target of 797. In addition to support from the Business Lincolnshire growth hub (see above) around 80 businesses rent business premises and office accommodation from LCC.

Qualifications achieved

The actual total of qualifications achieved is 1114 and therefore the indicator has been exceeded. The majority of these qualifications were achieved by adults who have returned to training. The qualifications are primarily in the core subjects of Maths and English, and as such they are the core skills that employers regularly require.






Our teams work together to provide a seamless business growth service.

To highlight, this includes the Brazilian owned Moy Park who have created an additional 46 new jobs with a £6m investment in robotics. Additionally 38 are from businesses who have received support through our Business Centres or Growth Hub and have secured new contracts or acquired new equipment or upgrade IT systems which has led them to expand. 








1,114 qualifications were achieved in 2018/2019, exceeding the annual target of 1,000. The 2018/19 performance programme was developed to focus on longer courses and qualification-based programmes. The Adult Skills & Family Learning service is providing higher level qualifications of longer duration compared to previous years. Learners have chosen to sit their qualifications between May and July (instead of between January and April), thereby giving them the best possible opportunity to achieve the qualifications undertaken. There continues to be high demand for the qualifications that the service delivers, ranging from GCSE English and Maths to Food Safety, helping learners to progress into work.





Further projects which submitted bids under the November 2018 call are being appraised and a further summer call has just been announced to take up remaining ERDF funds in our local area, where we hope to allocate the rest of the ERDF funding. The call will be open in June 2019 with a closing date of September 2019.

There have been three European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development projects contracted between January-March 2019 totalling £426,253.


