Summary:

Approval is sought to award the contract for the main works for resurfacing works on the B1191 Horncastle Road, Woodhall Spa.

Recommendation(s):

It is recommended that the Leader of the Council approves the award of the main contract for the B1191 Horncastle Road, Woodhall Spa resurfacing scheme

Alternatives Considered:

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| 1. | Not to award the contract which will result in the remedial works not being completed and the inevitable consequence that the road condition will continue to deteriorate, with deeper structural failures and ultimately result in a larger future cost of repair. |
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Reasons for Recommendation:

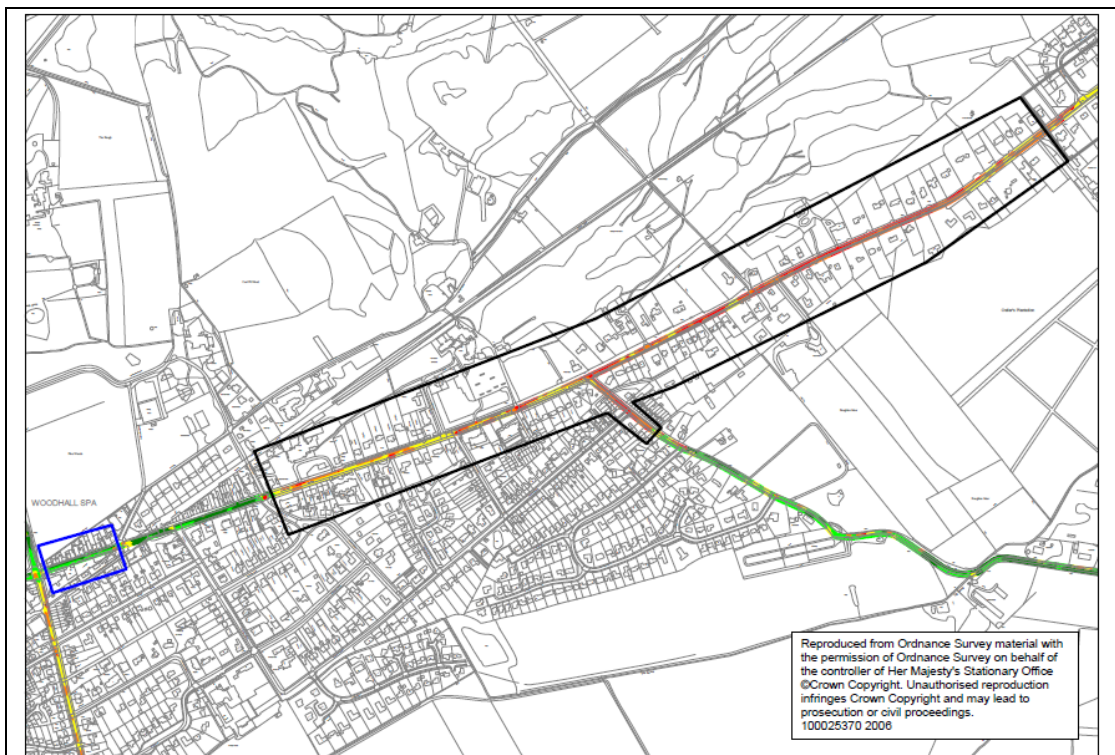
To allow the works to proceed and provide a serviceable, and safe, running surface for the travelling public.

1. Background

- 1.1 The B1191 Horncastle Road has been assessed by Lincs laboratory using a number of different techniques, including Dynamic Cone Penetration tests for bearing capacity, surface coring and deflectograph to inform the treatment schedule that has been tendered. The results of the testing placed this particular site on this year's list of resurfacing priorities.
- 1.2 The defects identified at this location are extensive material failures in the surfacing ranging from 100mm deep to 280mm deep. Drainage and footway defects also exist along shorter sections of this carriageway.

- 1.3 The proposals are to resurface 1.8km of this road and a further 170m of Kirkby Lane by planning out the existing surface and replacing it with Hot Rolled Asphalt, supported by deeper construction incorporating geogrid. The drainage will be repaired between Kirkby Lane and Tower Drive. Footways will be reconstructed in the vicinity of the golf club and from Kirkby Lane eastwards for a distance of approximately 500m.
- 1.4 The works will take place during daytime hours, restricted from 0800 hours to 2000 hours Monday to Friday. Weekend work will not be permitted.
- 1.5 The traffic will be controlled by the use of two way temporary traffic lights from 22nd until 29th October when a full closure of the B1191 will be implemented until the 30th November. The road will be open at the weekends.
- 1.6 Kirkby Lane will be closed for four days during the contract period. It will be re-opened each night.
- 1.7 For the road closures, signed suitable alternative routes will be provided and maintained in serviceable condition.
- 1.8 The works are currently being tendered via Lincolnshire County Councils Select List Framework. The estimated cost of the works is £1.193m
- 1.9 The whole scheme costs are:
- Costs incurred thus far
- Design fees - £25500
- Projected additional costs
- Resurfacing contract - £1,193,000
 - Supervision fees - £16500
 - Laboratory / final product testing costs - £12000
- TOTAL SCHEME COST - £1,247,000**
- 1.10 The scheme will be funded from the 2018/19 Highways Asset Protection PRN Budget, with a contribution towards the footways from the Highways Asset Protection Minor Works Budget.

2. Legal Issues:

Equality Act 2010

Under section 149 of the Equality Act 2010, the Council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:

- * Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Act

* Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it

* Foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

The duty cannot be delegated and must be discharged by the decision-maker. To discharge the statutory duty the decision-maker must analyse all the relevant material with the specific statutory obligations in mind. If a risk of adverse impact is identified consideration must be given to measures to avoid that impact as part of the decision making process

An Equality Impact Assessment has not been undertaken. This work is considered neutral in its impact on protected characteristics groups.

Joint Strategic Needs Analysis (JSNA) and the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy (JHWS)

The Council must have regard to the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) and the Joint Health & Well Being Strategy (JHWS) in coming to a decision

Consideration has been given to the JSNA and the JHWS and as can be seen from the objectives of the scheme set out above, the scheme has significant benefits for both the health and wellbeing of the people of Woodhall Spa.

Crime and Disorder
