Firstly we must apologise for the last minute email, we only noticed the report on Fridays 3rd/06/2016 in the Grantham Journal, in the evening as we were both working during the day. I spoke to Councillor Rosemary H Woolley who advised me to send this email. She also mentioned that she would be informing members of the Lincolnshire County Council and Regulation Committee to expect this email.

As I work on local farms and have been doing so for approximately forty years, within a radius of forty miles of the site, I have a good understanding of what is happening in the industry. The statement that concerns us is "the 33,000 tonnes would be farm waste meaning manure and slurries...from a ten mile radius of the plant". How is this possible? When it is fair to say there may only be about ten to twelve dairy/pig farms in that area. Having spoken to farmers they all want their own manure to benefit their land, which also has a cost saving over artificial manure. There is also a smell from manure and slurries. Without this amount of product, the only way to make it cost effective would be to use food waste or sewerage, which would smell.

So I do hope if any planning is approved, there is no way you would allow food or sewage waste to be used there in the future.
