Subject:	Emergency Planning – Exercise Black Swan	

Summary:

Following on from the cancellation of the national Tier 1 pandemic influenza exercise, Exercise Cygnus in October 2014, the Lincolnshire Resilience Forum Management Group agreed in March 2015 to support the delivery of a multi-agency exercise within the county focussing on a pandemic influenza scenario.

The exercise will take place on Thursday 15 October 2015 and will allow us to test not only health and social care resilience, but also to consider the wider business continuity aspects of a pandemic influenza.

This paper presents a (power point based) briefing on the exercise design.

Actions Required:

Members are asked to:

- 1. Consider and comment on the presentation and opportunities presented by this exercise to assure ourselves of our emergency planning arrangements for a major health related emergency in Lincolnshire.
- 2. Accept an invitation to observe the exercise.
- 3. Receive an update on the learning from this exercise once collated.

1. Background

A new influenza pandemic continues to be recognised as one of the four Tier 1 risks to the United Kingdom due to the impacts on public health and well-being, and on the likely disruption to 'normal' services resulting from the large numbers of infected people and the impact on staffing due to both illness of staff and the requirement to care for dependents who may fall ill.

A pandemic is likely to have significant impacts on the provision of health and social care with demand for the services increasing as capacity reduces. It will undermine our normal processes of working and may lead to restrictions on public gatherings, transportations and education.

The exercise provides an opportunity to test our multi-agency plans for such emergencies, challenging our planning assumptions about the impacts of such a pandemic and rehearse key people in their roles to deal with pandemics.

2. Conclusion

The attached presentation provides members with an overview of local objectives of the exercise, the exercise design and the methodology for capturing lessons learnt.
