Summary:

As set out in the Council's constitution, a key role for this Board is monitoring the work programmes of the other scrutiny committees. ADULTS AND COMMUNITY WELLBEING SCRUTINY COMMITTEE

ACTIVITY REPORT

<i>Item</i>	<i>Summary of Outcomes</i>
1 Keeping People Safe – The Lincolnshire Safeguarding Adults Board Prevention Strategy 2023-2026	The Committee recognised the importance of prevention, as set out in the strategy, which was underpinned by six safeguarding principles, as set out in the Care Act 2014. The Committee raised issues such as pressure ulcers; liaison between partners; and the number of safeguarding enquiries in residential care home and hospital settings. Making safeguarding personal was a key part of the prevention strategy, but the Committee was assured that this did not remove the focus from taking a strategic overview of challenges and developments.
2 Substance Misuse Services Re-Commissioning	The Committee supported the recommissioning of Substance Misuse Services, recognising the serious impacts of alcohol and drugs misuse on individuals, their families, and communities as a whole. The Committee believed the Lincolnshire's estimated numbers of dependent alcohol users (7,000), and cocaine and opiate users (4,000) understated the level of need but acknowledged the constraints on expenditure. The Committee also made observations to the Executive on the new contract; the grant for the substance misuse family support service; pathways into the service; and key performance indicators.
3 Adult Care and Community Wellbeing Financial Position 2022-23	The Committee noted an overall underspend of £0.7 million, and commended the directorate for its financial management, as this was the eleventh year that services had been delivered within budget. The Committee also reflected on the Better Care Fund; potential unmet demand; investment in extra care

	housing, including the transfer of the underspend to capital funding; and five-yearly health checks for people aged 40 – 74.
4	<p>Service Level Performance Reporting Against the Success Framework 2022-23 Quarter 4</p> <p>The report highlighted that the 15 out of the 18 targets had either been met or exceeded. The Committee's attention focused on the following four indicators: (i) permanent admissions to residential and nursing care homes aged 65+, where there had been an increase in more complex cases; (ii) concluded safeguarding enquiries where the desired outcomes were achieved; (iii) people that report that services help them have control over their daily life, where the local target had been set above the national average; and (iv) the percentage of alcohol users that left specialist treatment successfully, where the complexities of clients were increasing.</p>

<i>Item</i>	<i>Summary of Outcomes</i>
1	<p>Lincolnshire Safeguarding Adults Board Update</p> <p>As part of its regular update from the LSAB, the Committee explored issues such as the training offer to front line staff; the monitoring of attendance at safeguarding interviews, including reasons for non-attendance; co-ordination between agencies, such as the Lincolnshire Police and the NHS; and the emphasis on person-centred safeguarding processes.</p>
2	<p>Day Services Update</p> <p>Transport to and from the centres offering day services is reliant on its availability, and in certain instances clients are required to leave centres as early as 1.30 pm. The Committee was assured that there was work in hand to provide dedicated transport, which would not be used for home-to-school transport. In addition to this issue, the Committee also received assurances on direct payment processes, and the drop-in offer. The Committee concluded that day services presented a service, which was valued by its clients.</p>
3	<p>Service Level Performance against the Corporate Performance Framework 2023-24 Quarter 1</p> <p>The Committee reviewed performance, where. As some of the targets were not being met on a consistent basis, the Committee suggested that where a target was consistently not being met, consideration should be given to whether it has been set at the appropriate level.</p>

4	Acute Hospitals - Admission to Discharge Care Pathway and Winter Planning 2023/4	The Committee congratulated the service for the various initiatives undertaken to promote the safe discharge of patients from acute hospitals into other settings to release hospital beds for those patients who need them. These initiatives included active recovery beds; the reablement service; and the care transfer hub. The Committee also reviewed the arrangements for winter planning for 2023-24, which was being developed with all the relevant partners, which would include virtual wards; integrated therapies; the hospital avoidance response team; and the home recovery team.

14 June 2023	
<i>Item</i>	<i>Summary of Outcomes</i>
1 Consultation on Paediatric Services at Pilgrim Hospital, Boston	The Committee considered the consultation by United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust on its paediatric service at Pilgrim Hospital, Boston, where the proposal would enable almost every child or young person to receive all their care in Boston. Very few children, usually those with complex or specialist needs, would be transferred to other hospitals for their treatment, which had been the case prior to 2018. The Committee agreed that its response be submitted to the meeting on 19 July for its approval.
2 East Midlands Ambulance Service NHS Trust - Performance	The Committee welcomed the improvements from the East Midlands Ambulance Service, in particular in ambulance response times since the peaks of December 2022; and the clinical navigator initiative at Lincoln County and Pilgrim Hospitals. The Committee was advised of Trust-wide investment of £23 million during 2023/24, with the aim of improving the responses to category two calls.
3 NHS Joint Forward Plan	The NHS Lincolnshire Joint Forward Plan was a plan for NHS services in the county, required by legislation to be prepared before the start of each financial year. The Committee supported the five core priorities: a new partnership with the public; living well and staying well (prevention); access; integration with community care; and people. Further items would be considered as required.

4	GP Provision in Lincolnshire	<p>The Committee considered reports from both NHS Lincolnshire Integrated Care Board and the Local Medical Committee, during which the Committee raised issues such as access to online services and via telephone; NHS Lincolnshire Integrated Care Board's work with GP practices rated inadequate or requires improvement by the CQC; and the role of primary care networks.</p> <p>The Committee welcomed the increase of 43 per cent in the number of appointments in GP practice between 2019 and 2023 and supported further measures to enhance access to GP services, such as improved recruitment and retention, and access to funding for additional roles in GP practices.</p>

1	NHS Dental Services in Lincolnshire	<p>A particular concern for the Committee was the closure of a dental practice in Skegness on 30 June 2023, which made a total of four closures in the last eighteen months. The Committee requested a further report in early 2024, including information on any further developments on the commissioning of NHS dental services in the East Lindsey area; and the development of the implementation plan for the dental strategy.</p> <p>The Committee also recorded its support for the concept of a postgraduate dental school in Lincolnshire, as a means of aiding the recruitment and retention of NHS dentists. The Chairman has written on behalf of the Committee to the Lincolnshire Members of Parliament seeking their support for this.</p>
2	Water Fluoridation	<p>The Committee was advised of the evidence in support of water fluoridation and its impact on oral health, the legislative changes on fluoridation schemes and the current situation with water fluoridation in Lincolnshire. The Chairman also wrote on behalf of the Committee to the NHS Lincolnshire ICB to record the Committee's support for extending fluoridation. Copies of the letters were sent to the relevant Lincolnshire Members of Parliament who represent constituencies either wholly or partially without water fluoridation; and the relevant district councils, whose areas</p>

3	Outcome of Consultation on Local Mental Health Rehabilitation Services (Ashley House in Grantham)	<p>The Committee noted the outcome of the mental health rehabilitation consultation, conducted by the NHA between 16 January and 31 March 2023; and the decision by Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, with support from NHS Lincolnshire Integrated Care Board, to permanently close Ashley House in Grantham and extend the community rehabilitation service to a county-wide model.</p> <p>The Committee requested an update in one year's time on the implementation of the community rehabilitation service model, including monitoring of out of area placements and any data on projected future need for inpatient beds. The Committee also requested that any proposals for the future use of the Ashley House premises be shared.</p>
4	Update on Adult Mental Health Services in Lincolnshire	<p>The Committee's working group on Preventing Suicide and Mental concluded in March 2023 that the Committee would benefit from a series of reports from Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (LPFT) on its services, with a particular focus on new developments in services and meeting any increased demand. The first of these items focused on adult mental health services, which included: the crisis teams, in-patient care as well as psychological therapies. The Committee's focus was on waiting lists and the transition between services, as well as new services funded in the last few years. The Committee agreed to receive updates on any future developments.</p>
5	Lincolnshire Acute Service Review - Urgent & Emergency Care and Acute Medicine Implementation Update	<p>In May 2022 the NHS in Lincolnshire decided to implement its preferred options from the Lincolnshire Acute Services Review, following consultation. This item focused on the implementation of two of the four items: the urgent treatment centre at Grantham and District Hospital, and the conversion of the acute beds at Grantham to a combination of acute and community beds.</p> <p>The Committee was advised that the urgent treatment centre at Grantham and District Hospital was due to open during the 'autumn of 2023', together with the new acute and community and medical bed arrangements. The Committee looked forward to the re-opening of the 24/7 overnight care in Grantham and the implementation of the acute and community bed arrangements.</p>

6	Paediatric Service at Pilgrim Hospital, Boston - Proposed Response of the Committee to the Consultation	The Committee approved its response to the consultation on paediatric services at Pilgrim Hospital, Boston, in which the Committee for Lincolnshire accepted that the new model of paediatric care at Pilgrim Hospital was not dissimilar to the pre-2018 inpatient service. The Committee was satisfied that this model was in the best interests of children and their families in Boston and the surrounding area, as well as Lincolnshire as a whole.

1	Cancer Care in Lincolnshire and Living with Cancer Programme	<p>The Committee was advised that from October 2023, the NHS will be working to three cancer care standards (instead of the previous nine), which can be summarised as: (1) a maximum of 28 days from referral to diagnosis or cancer being ruled out, referred to as the faster diagnosis standard; (2) a maximum of 31 days from the decision to treat to the date of treatment, with NHS England requiring this is met in 75% of cases by March 2025; and (3) a maximum of 62 days from referral to the first definitive treatment.</p> <p>The Committee was advised of and welcomed a range of improvements and initiatives over the last year, which included: (a) an overall reduction in treatment backlogs; and (b) the implementation of new treatment pathways.</p> <p>The Committee supported further plans for improvement and requested a further report in one year's time, to include information relating to co-morbidities, and support for young people and families.</p>
2	Nuclear Medicine, United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust	Nuclear medicine uses radioactive substances for diagnostic imaging and treatment. In 2022 the Committee did not support proposals by United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust (ULHT) in 2022 to consolidate the service at Lincoln County Hospital. The service closed at Pilgrim Hospital, Boston, in January 2023 and is due to close at Grantham and District Hospital in 2024. The Committee was advised that the service standards were being met and requested a further report after six months of the service being fully centralised at Lincoln County Hospital.

3	Children and Young People’s Mental Health Services in Lincolnshire	The Committee’s working group on Preventing Suicide and Mental concluded in March 2023 that the Committee would benefit from a series of reports from Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (LPFT) on its services, with a particular focus on new developments in services and meeting any increased demand. The second of these items focused on children and young people mental health services, which included CAMHS and the helplines available to young people. The Committee thanked LPFT for their presentation and agreed to be advised of any future development in these services.
4	Older People Mental Health and Dementia Services in Lincolnshire	The Committee’s working group on Preventing Suicide and Mental concluded in March 2023 that the Committee would benefit from a series of reports from Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (LPFT) on its services, with a particular focus on new developments in services and meeting any increased demand. The third of these items focused on older adult mental health and dementia services. Traditionally, the divide between adult and older adult was the age of 65, but the Committee was advised that there was more flexibility in this approach. The Committee thanked LPFT for their presentation and asked to be advised of any future development in these services.
5	Humber Acute Services Programme – Update	<p>The Committee considered the latest developments in the Humber Acute Services Programme, which was developing proposals for changes to services at Diana Princess of Wales Hospital in Grimsby and Scunthorpe General Hospital. The Committee noted that the first planned meeting of the Lincolnshire and Humber Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee would be held on 17 October 2023 in Scunthorpe.</p> <p>The Committee indicated that aside from the joint committee, it would like to consider the matter itself, which was subsequently arranged for 8 November 2023.</p>

<p>1 Urgent and Emergency Care Update: (a) A&E Services and Impact on Patient Discharge, (b) Urgent Treatment Centres, (c) NHS 111 Service, (d) Restoration and Recovery of (a), (b) and (c).</p>	<p>The Committee received an update on urgent and emergency care, including details of the actions being taken locally in response to the national Delivery Plan for Recovering Urgent and Emergency Care Services.</p> <p>This wide-ranging item included information on accident and emergency departments, urgent treatment centres, NHS 111, Lincolnshire’s clinical assessment service; and arrangements for patient flow and discharge in acute hospitals. The Committee also considered how local planning was in line with NHS England’s national guidance on recovering urgent and emergency care services. The Committee was told that subject to industrial action, the NHS in Lincolnshire was confident of meeting a national target for 76% of patients attending emergency and urgent care to be admitted, transferred or discharged within four hours by March 2024.</p> <p>The Committee has requested that the outcomes of a review of demand in urgent treatment centres (excluding Grantham urgent treatment centre, which is yet to open) and other urgent care facilities such as the Stamford minor injuries unit are shared, and consultation takes place on any changes in service provision, including opening hours. The Committee will also consider an update after the winter period.</p>
<p>2 Lincolnshire System Winter Planning</p>	<p>The Committee considered a report on the steps being taken to deliver the NHS England requirements and ongoing development and delivery of the Lincolnshire system winter plan.</p> <p>As part of this item, which included plans for managing winter pressures across the health and social care system, the Committee was advised that whilst responding to the demands of winter, the local NHS, unlike previous years, would have to continue with its focus on delivering elective and cancer care, to reduce waiting lists and maintain cancer care standards.</p> <p>The Committee recorded its support for the work undertaken by the NHS and other partners, including Lincolnshire County Council, in their preparation for the winter pressures of 2023/24.</p>
