**Summary:**  
 Approval is sought to award a contract for the main works for resurfacing works at the A631 Corringham.

**Recommendation(s):**

- 1) That the Leader of the Council approves the award of a main contract for the A631 Corringham; and
- 2) Delegates to the Director of Place, in consultation with the Executive Councillor for Highways, Transport and IT, authority to determine and enter into the final form of contract.

**Alternatives Considered:**

1.	Not to award a contract which will result in the remedial works not being completed and the inevitable consequence that the road condition will continue to deteriorate, with deeper structural failures and ultimately result in a larger cost of future repair.
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**Reasons for Recommendation:**  
 To allow the works to proceed and provide a serviceable, and safe, running surface for the travelling public.

**1. Background**

1.1 The A631 at Corringham has been assessed by Lincs laboratory using a number of different techniques, including Dynamic Cone Penetration tests for bearing

capacity, surface coring and deflectograph to inform the treatment schedule that has been tendered. The results of the testing placed this particular site on this years list of resurfacing priorities.

- 1.2 The defects identified at these locations are extensive material failures in the surfacing. The treatments derived from these defects will be from 40mm to 330mm of new surfacing.
- 1.3 The proposals are to resurface a total of 3.4km of this road by planing out the existing surface and replacing it with Hot Rolled Asphalt, supported by deeper construction incorporating a small area of geogrid where necessary. Minor kerb and drainage repairs will be undertaken whilst in attendance.
- 1.4 Work will take place during night time hours Monday to Friday. Work will take place from 7pm until 6am. The option to work weekends will be reserved should it be deemed necessary. Access to residential properties will be maintained at all times.
- 1.5 Traffic will be managed by road closures with signed suitable alternative routes will be provided and maintained in serviceable condition.
- 1.6 The works are currently being tendered via Lincolnshire County Councils Select List Framework. The estimated cost of the works is £1,450,000.
- 1.7 The whole scheme costs are:

Costs incurred thus far

- Design fees - £18,500

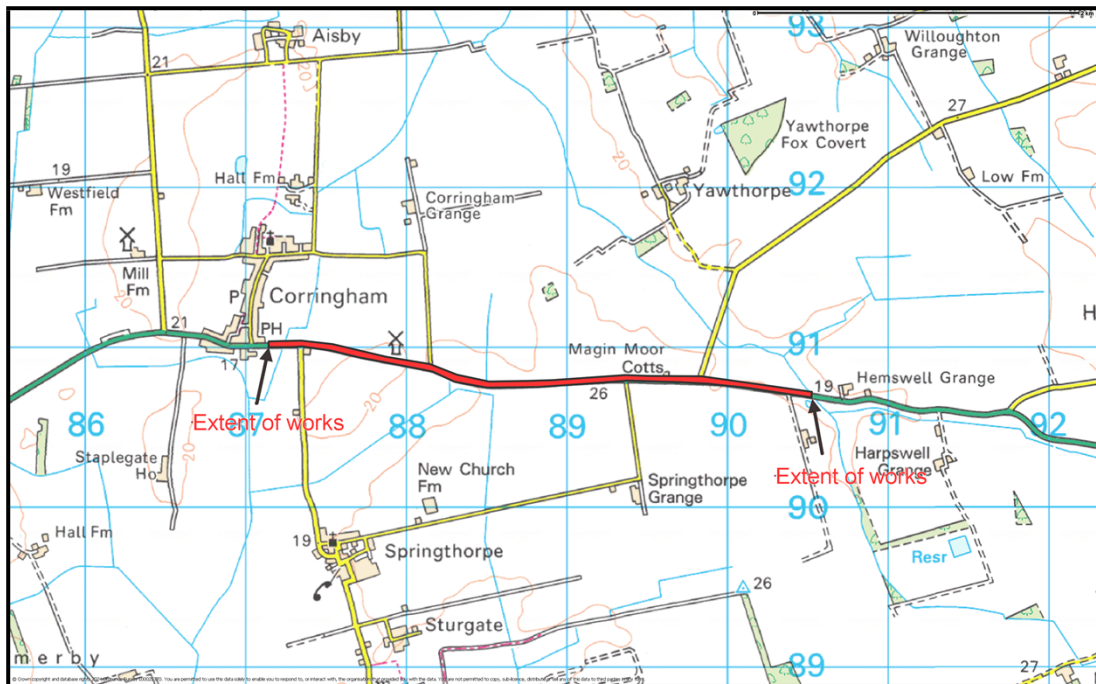
Projected additional costs

- Resurfacing contract - £1,450,000
- Supervision fees - £22,500
- Laboratory / final product testing costs - £21,000

**TOTAL SCHEME COST - £1,512,000**

- 1.8 The scheme will be funded from the 2024/25 Highways Asset Protection PRN Budgets.

## 2. Legal Issues:

### Equality Act 2010

Under section 149 of the Equality Act 2010, the Council must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:

Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under the Act.

Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

Foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

The relevant protected characteristics are age; disability; gender reassignment; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; and sexual orientation.

Having due regard to the need to advance equality of opportunity involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to:

- Remove or minimise disadvantages suffered by persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are connected to that characteristic.
- Take steps to meet the needs of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic that are different from the needs of persons who do not share it.

- Encourage persons who share a relevant protected characteristic to participate in public life or in any other activity in which participation by such persons is disproportionately low.

The steps involved in meeting the needs of disabled persons that are different from the needs of persons who are not disabled include, in particular, steps to take account of disabled persons' disabilities.

Having due regard to the need to foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it involves having due regard, in particular, to the need to tackle prejudice, and promote understanding.

Compliance with the duties in section 149 may involve treating some persons more favourably than others.

The duty cannot be delegated and must be discharged by the decision-maker. To discharge the statutory duty the decision-maker must analyse all the relevant material with the specific statutory obligations in mind. If a risk of adverse impact is identified consideration must be given to measures to avoid that impact as part of the decision making process.

An Equality Impact Assessment has not been undertaken. This work is considered neutral in its impact on protected characteristics groups.

#### Joint Strategic Needs Analysis (JSNA and the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy (JHWS)

The Council must have regard to the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) and the Joint Health & Well Being Strategy (JHWS) in coming to a decision.

Consideration has been given to the JSNA and the JHWS and there are not considered to be any significant impacts on the health and wellbeing of the people of Lincolnshire.

#### Crime and Disorder

Under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, the Council must exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in its area (including anti-social and other behaviour adversely affecting the local environment), the misuse of drugs, alcohol and other substances in its area and re-offending in its area.

The works outlined above are not considered to have an impact on Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 matters.

### **3. Conclusion**

The results of Lincs Laboratory testing has placed this site on this year's list of resurfacing priorities. This Report seeks approval for the award of a contract for the carrying out of the necessary works.
